The theater party will provide support for the sorority's continuing financial aid to cerebral palsy sufferers at the Oakland County Society for Crippled Children and Adults and encouragement to creative artists at the MacDowell in Peterborough, N. H.

ALMOST 300 alumnae of Alpha Chi Omega in the Birmingham area have received invitations to attend the sorority's annual State Day on April 11 in Grand Rapids.

Grand Rapids alumnae will be hostesses for workshop sessions and luncheons at Blytheholme in that city. Guest speaker will be Mrs. Wilbur G. Payne, of Winnetka, Ill., national president of the sorority's 55,000 members.

Founded at DePauw University, 1885, Alpha Chi Omega presently has 99 collegiate chapters (five in Michigan) and over 250

alumnae groups. The largest national philanthropic endeavor of all active and alumnae chapters is the Easter Seal Project, or aid to cerebral palsy victims, through the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults. The Oakland County branch of this organization in Pontiac receives year-round support from Birmingham Alpha Chis.

SCHOLARSHIPS ARE granted to professional people working in the field of cerebral palsy.

During the past year 19 new awards were given. Supplementarily projects include the making of self-help toys for handicapped children and cooperative efforts with state and local societies for crippled children.

An added project this year is the undergraduate scholarship program established for the purpose of aiding members who would not be able to remain in college without financial assistance.
