

Seven Golfers Qualify for Carling Open

Two golfers from Formosa and two from Japan will represent Asia in the \$500,000 Carling World Open at Oakland Hills, August 27-30. Qualifiers were Hsieh Yung Yo and Lu Chang Hsiang of Free China and Kōchi Uno and Tameo Inui of Japan, the top four Asiatic players in the Hong Kong Open, just completed at Hong Kong's Royal Golf Club. Hsieh also won the Hong Kong Open in a sudden-death playoff with Alan Murray of Australia. The Oakland Hills tournament is the first sanctioned international golf competition and will draw top golfers from all over the world.

ALSO QUALIFYING for the Carling Open were South Africa's Bob Verwey, Allan Henning and Cedric Amm, Verwey is Gary Player's brother-in-law. Player was exempt from qualifying because of his victories on the American pro tour.

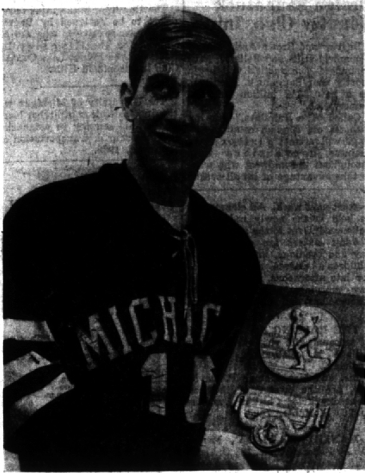

Pony, Colt Leagues Schedule Tryouts

Flu Bug Losing In Medical War, U-M Doctor Says

The "flu bug" is fighting a losing battle according to a University of Michigan physician, who claims the future looks promising for Americans who want more effective—and less expensive—protection against influenza.

Scientists have reason to be encouraged about the results of research on two new types of vaccines against the "flu," said Dr. Fred M. Davernport of the U.M. School of Public Health, who discussed the subject recently at an American Medical Association clinical session.

MORE THAN ten years' experience with influenza vaccines suspended in mineral oil has shown that they give a high antibody level—and hence protection—which lasts "at least eight to nine years after a single dose," he said.

The oil-base vaccines can be produced more cheaply than can the vaccines marketed for mass use today, Dr. Davernport remarked. They also minimize the immediate reactions some people experience after receiving a "flu shot."

"The results of extensive follow-up studies involving large populations attest to the safety of the product," he noted. It is now licensed for sale in Great Britain.
