## DB&T to Remodel Hamilton Branch

One of downtown Birmingham's largest buildings, the Detroit Bank & Trust office at Woodward and Hamilton is scheduled to receive a major exterior renovation, important interior changes and a new customer parking lot.

The project is part of the bank's current million dollar branch office expansion and modernization program and involves nine of the bank's offices in a three-county area.

The first step in the extensive program will be the completion of a customer parking lot. The lot, to be located behind the building and along Hamilton, will accommodate 28 cars.

It will be surfaced with asphalt paving and is expected to be available for customer use in May.

IN OUTLINING the details of the bank's extensive modernization program, Charles E. Hewitt, Detroit Bank & Trust president, said, "Birmingham and its surrounding communities is one of the bank's most important commercial and residential areas."

"A great deal of thought and planning has been invested in this program to remodel and expand our buildings and the services we render to our Birmingham customers. We recognize that with more parking and increased banking facilities we will be able to serve the financial needs of our Birmingham and Bloomfield area customers better."

Hewitt also pointed to the bank's drive-in office two blocks north at Woodward and Oakland as another example of tasteful bank architecture combined with modern efficiency.

The most dramatic effect of the remodeling of the Birmingham office will be the installation of three ten foot high by fifteen foot wide glass, window-walls that together form an entrance and extend along the entire width of the forty-three foot building fronting on Woodward.

Above the windows and to a height of seventeen feet will be a new ceramic facing comprised of a series of eighteen inch square panels of ceramic tile.

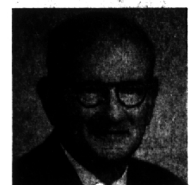
