

# County May Order Airport Needs Study

Airport development again is a question before Pontiac and Oakland County officials.

The Oakland County Board of Supervisors aviation committee will meet Thursday to negotiate a contract with a San Francisco firm for a study of airport needs in the county.

Leigh Fisher Associates, a consulting firm, has agreed tentatively to conduct a three-month study for a fee of \$10,000.

In a letter to Pontiac city commissioners this week, Charles B. Edwards, Jr., chairman of the county aviation committee, proposed that the county acquire Pontiac Municipal Airport in a trade for some 40 acres of county-owned land.

Included would be property, mostly vacant, in the north end of Pontiac and the block-long site of the former county courthouse at Huron and Saginaw in Pontiac.

properties have been appraised at \$700,000. Pontiac has more than that invested in the city airport.

Pontiac city commissioners have termed the airport too large a project for the city to develop alone. There has been a move for the past year for joint city-county participation in a multimillion-dollar expansion program.

The county still owns the Allen Airport in Orion Township, near the I-75 freeway. Pontiac plans two years ago for construction of a major jet airport there met with strong citizen objection and were dropped after Federal aeronautics authorities failed to give approval.



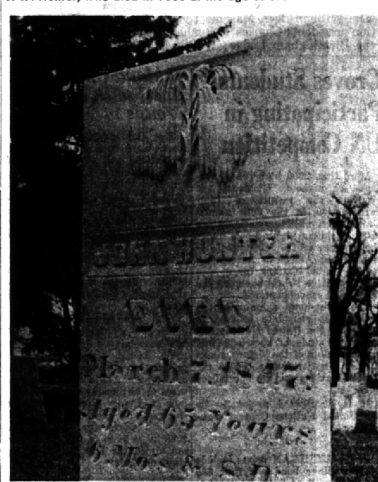

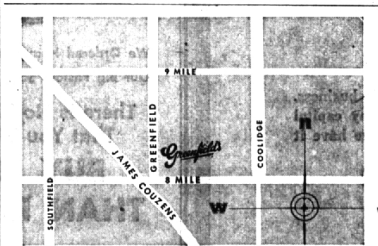

This was a full year after Franklin's John Hunter is said by his gravestone to have died.

son (wishing to buy liquor whom he suspects to be under age.

A report from the planning board for Westwood Estates, a subdivision was directed to obtain specifications and estimates of cost to extend the water mains in Nottingham Forest No. 1 and No. 2 to two lots located between 18 and 14 Mile roads west of Lahser.

The extension was requested by the residents.

A request by Mrs. Ted Zikowski, 23301 Maple Ridge, Southfield, to tap in to the village water and sewer facilities was referred to Murphy, who will inform her of the charges and tell her that the council retains the right to discontinue the service.

Councilman Edward F. Dola requested the appointment of George O. Gale, 31281 Fairfax, to the planning commission. He was approved unanimously.

IN REFERENCE to another extension of contract with the Colledge Excavating Co., Councilman John Magee pointed out that "we have not had bids on an excavation job for two years. We'd better have some up-to-date ideas about costs." The matter will be studied by the water and sewer commission.

The same commission will study a complaint by the Greenwich Green Association that catch basins are inadequate in the Old Post Road area, Ralph Wilkie, 32811 Old Post Road, brought the matter to the council's attention.

John Daly, 18331 Chelton, also complained to the council about its own back yard. He mentioned broken and surplus pipe lying on the property, and trucks backing over the curbs on to the street where children are playing.

He further noted the fire hazard of the open incinerator. Councilman Magee, chairman of the administrative commission, assured him the matter was under study and would be "corrected thoroughly."

A low bid of \$375 for an aerial survey, or mosaic of the village, submitted by Clark Aerial Survey Corp. of Pontiac, was accepted.
