

Tax, Civil Rights Considered At Rice-Marian Model Senate

On Thursday, April 2, Brother Rice High School held its first annual Model Senate. The Senate was a joint Marian-Brother Rice project and was largely a student endeavor. Mr. James Murphy and Brother Paramo moderated the event with the assistance of Sister Veronica of Marian.

One hundred senators participated in the Senate's deliberations, which were directed by a student administration. While Dan Corrigan was president pro-tem of the Senate, John MacAloon, as vice-president, directed the proceedings on the Senate floor.

Other administration members were Jim Dean, chairman of the Rules Committee; Kevin Wolcott, chairman of the Bills Committee; and Christine Rock, who was Senate secretary. Dale Gardner and his committee set up the actual Senate floor.

considered two bills which are of major importance today, the tax cut bill and the civil rights bill.

Abbreviated versions of the actual Senate bills were distributed to the BRHS senators who were permitted to submit amendments. Twelve amendments were submitted to the Civil Rights Committee, only five to the Tax Cut Committee.

Each senator served on one of the two committees, which met in the morning and reported the bills to the floor for debate. The tax cut bill, the first to be considered, passed by a vote of 68-22.

The civil rights bill, however, had considerably more trouble in passing. Although the final vote was 50-32 with one abstention, the determined opposition of a coalition of Southern Democrats and Northern Republicans allowed the bill to pass with only a 10-vote majority.

THE MAJORITY leader, Bob Bickner (D. Mass.), felt that the

bill was sufficiently strong enough to be effective. Realizing themselves heavily outnumbered, the opposition, headed by John McGuckin (D. Miss.) and Pat Kaufmann (R. Tex.), felt that they had gained a major victory in that no funds have been appropriated to administer the bill.

At the end of the day, trophies were presented to the 10 best senators. Judging was made on the basis of work in the committees, on the Senate floor and amendments submitted.

Theater-in-Round Sets Annual Play

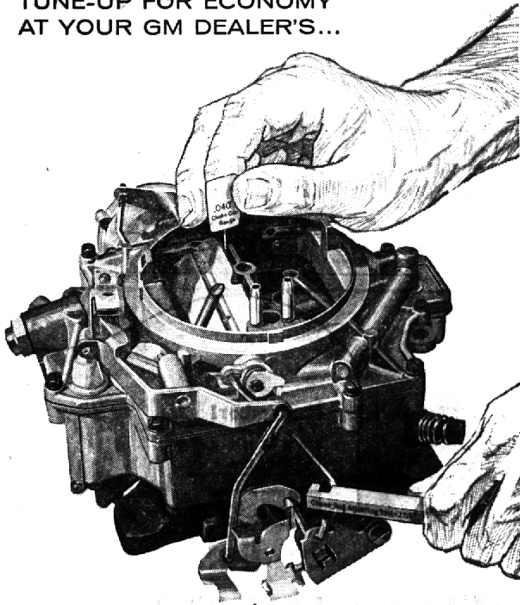

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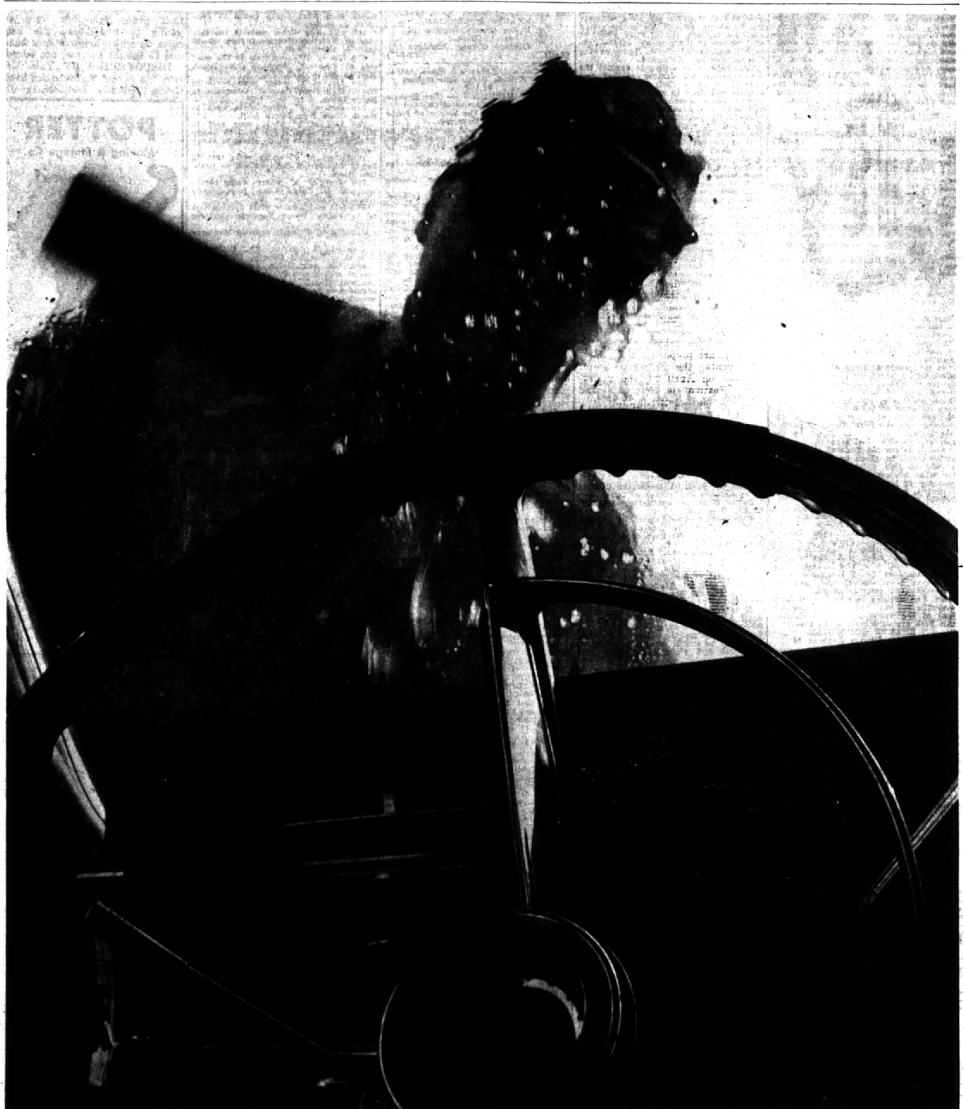
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THE BROTHER RICE Senate



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
