Highest local winner in the senior division, grades 10 through 12, was Wendy Nahabedian, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Nahabedian of Walnut Lake Road. She took third place in the biology category with an exhibit entitled "De-stating the Liver." Wendy is a senior at Groves High where her biology teacher is Edgar Dotson.

In the same category, Gregory Baumann, 16, of Rouge Circle, who studies under Mrs. L. Cooch at Seaholm High was a special award winner with his exhibit, "A Study of Changes in Bacterial Characteristics to Explain the Effects of Radio-Frequency Currents."

**THE ONLY LOCAL** winner in the junior division, grades seven through nine, was Jim Barron, 13, of Amberly Road, whose "Wing Lift" took first place in the experiments classification for eighth graders. His science teacher is Mrs. P. Decker of Derby Junior High.

Public, private and parochial students in the tri-county area entered 3,500 exhibits in the regional

fairs held on March 21. Of these, 1,500 were selected for exhibition in Cobo Hall, and from this number, the final winners were chosen. The winners, their parents and teachers were guests at the annual awards banquet held at the Engineering Society of Detroit Saturday night. Glenn V. 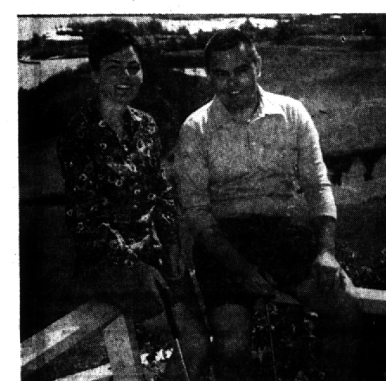
## May Rites

## Businesswomen Set April 21 Meeting

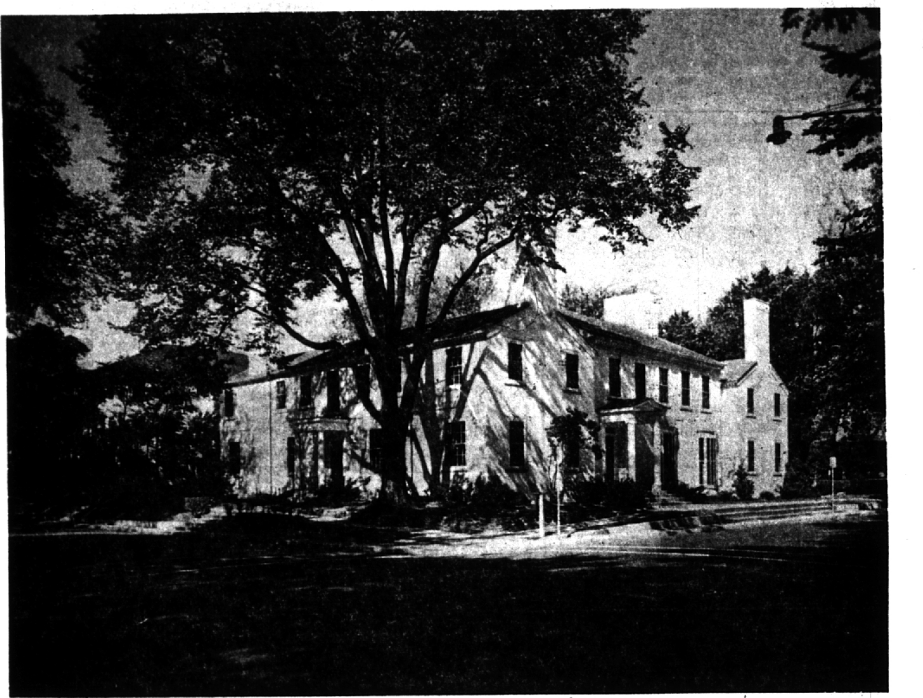
