S'field Mayor Backs 'State Equalization'

The forthcoming proposal of spreading Southfield's budget on a state equalized basis was the topic of a letter sent to The Birmingham Eccentric by Mayor James Clarkson.

Stating that Southfield is already on a state equalized value and that utilization of the money is the real issue, Clarkson went on to state that the city had one of the lowest tax rates in southeastern Michigan.

"First, the average citizen in the City of Southfield pays to its city government only \$45.54 per year on an average-priced home of \$18,000, or \$76 per week, for all of the services rendered by the municipality to him. These services include garbage and rubbish pickup, which alone you cannot possibly get for this price, and in addition thereto, Police and Fire protection, to name a few of the other services rendered to the homeowner."

"SECOND, THE average taxes that you pay for your school and county, amount to considerably more, and this same homeowner pays to those entities approximately \$350 per year for their services."

"Also, please note that the school and the county are already operated on a state equalized value. This follows the law passed in 1950, which we must follow."

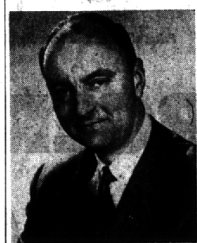
