Marian was the scene Sunday, April 12, for the South Oakland Conference on Race and Religion, sponsored by the Council of Churches of Metropolitan Detroit, the Jewish Community Council of Metropolitan Detroit and the Archdiocese of Detroit.

The day consisted of concurrent discussion workshops, in addition to a two-hour panel discussion given by Rabbi Morris Adler, Father Hayes and Rev. O'Grady.

In addition to holding a profitable question and answer period, the members formulated concrete resolutions and made several recommendations toward the elimination of discrimination in all areas of community life.

Working with the chairman of the Archbishop's Committee for Human Relations, Rev. Wm. E. Hoerauf and Mrs. Frank B.
