Area Students Are Science Fair Winners

Wendy Nahabedian, George Kilma and J. W. Alkan were named winners at the annual Science Fair in Detroit. Wendy's project was titled "Degenerative Fatty Infiltration of the Liver."

In her project she gave carbon tetrachloride orally to 16 rats at certain intervals of time for approximately two months. The carbon tetrachloride produced an excess of fat on the liver cells. To detect the damage done, she sacrificed the rats and made microscopic slides to study the cell structure.

GEORGE'S PROJECT was titled "Ion Migration and Periodic Precipitation." It involved passing a current of electricity through a U-shaped glass tube which contained a mixture of two chemical compounds. J. W.'s project was awarded one of seven special awards in Chemistry.

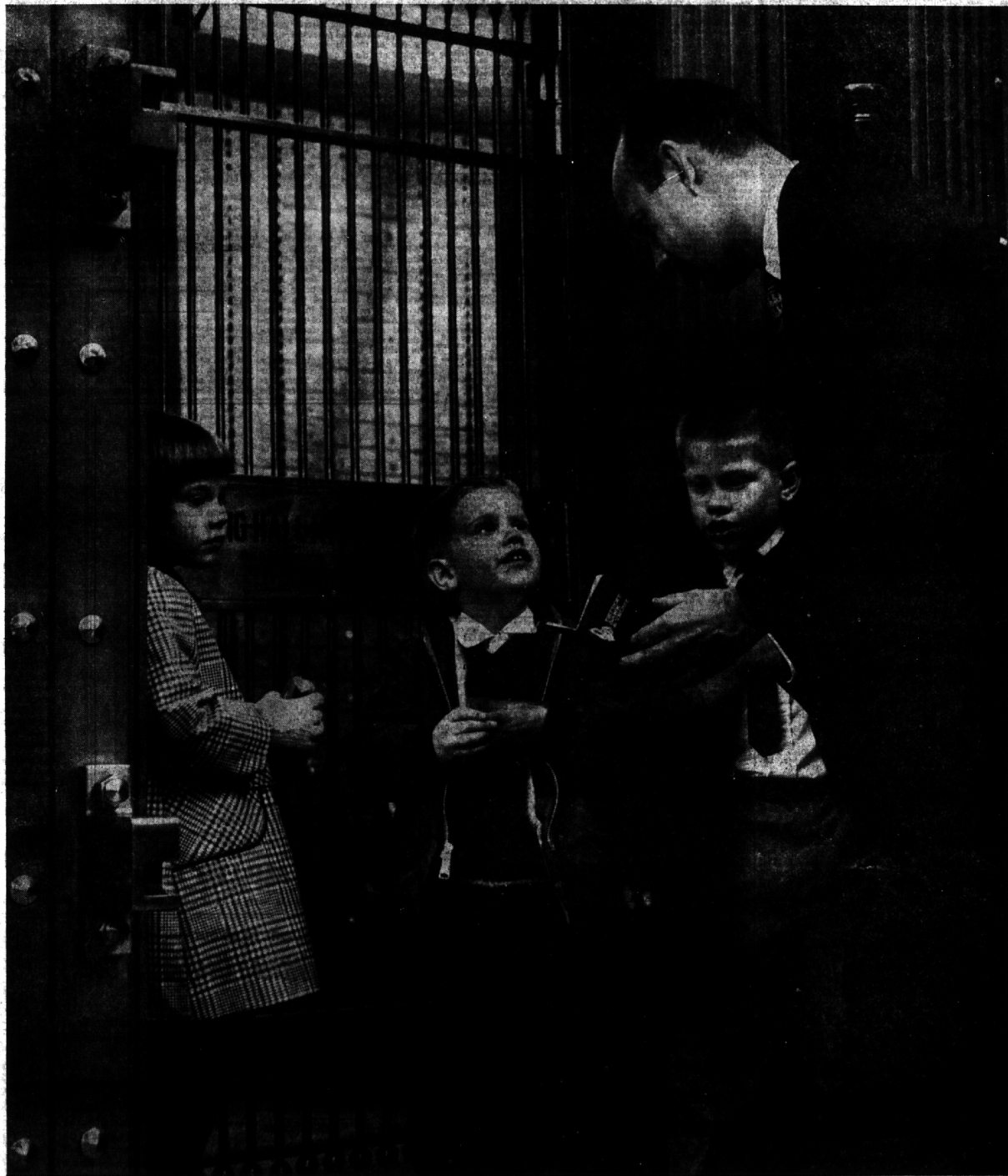
School reopened on April 6. At the school assembly, honors, and commendations were awarded to various students in the High School and in the Middle School. Those receiving honors are:
