

Swim Project Interrupts Hills' Board

The Bloomfield Hills School Board adjourned in the middle of its regular meeting Tuesday night to confer informally with representatives of West Bloomfield Township and Walnut Lake residents on the school district's proposed use of Walnut Lake for a summer recreational swimming program.

Ed Wiebert, recreation director, outlined proposed lake usage which was more limited than previous proposals. He said the lake would be used five days a week for six weeks from 10 to 5 p.m. for supervised swimming instruction only. Classes throughout the day would have a maximum of 60 children at a time.

Representing the opposing group were Martin Butzel, John Nabalanian, Julius Offenstain, George Mack, Joseph Radam, Walter Whitmer and Henry Moses.

BUTZEL SAID that he felt there would be no bathroom facilities at the beach. He also told the board that plans to provide a beach underneath the shallow water at the lake's edge were impractical as residents had found that it could not be done satisfactorily.

Moses, chairman of the West Bloomfield Planning Commission, told the board that township residents felt that existence of swimming facilities would make an unmanageable situation, with uncontrolled use of the lake arising. He said the township would use all means to stop the school district's plans.

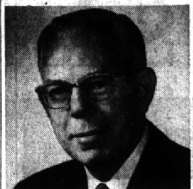
The board agreed to consider objections and to confer again with the group as to its decision.

Township Granted Water Main Funds

Attorney General Frank J. Kelley, chairman of the municipal finance commission, announced that the commission approved a total of \$109,000 for 1964 special assessment water main and water improvement bonds for Bloomfield Township.

District 143 will be allocated \$20,000 for new water mains, while District 144 will be given \$64,000.

The largest allocation, \$146,000, will be used for Districts 138 through 141.

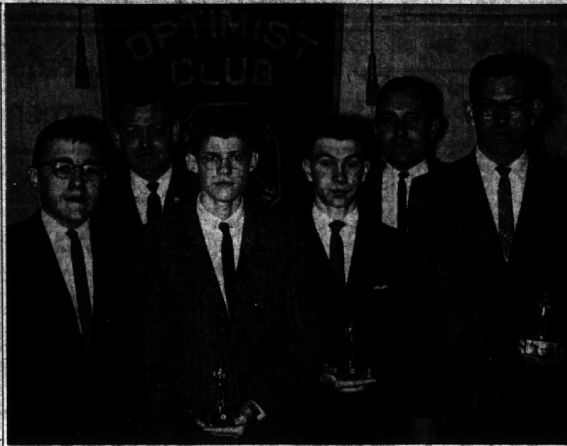
Grand Trunk Posts New Rail Times
