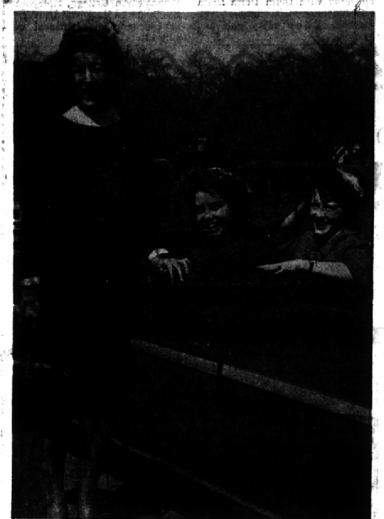
As one of four hostess chapters for the convention, the local chapter has spent over a year making arrangements for delegates from more than 100 Michigan chapters.
