In the past I have displayed many hands for offensive abilities, but today is a hand for those of you who, like myself, enjoy a good defense. This hand was played in Birmingham recently by Ernest and Kay Clinton.

Most good North and South pairs played this hand at three no-trump and made their bid. The defense looks fairly simple, but most players failed to see it.

Neither Vulnerable: Dealer:

West

The bidding:

WEST NORTH EAST SOUTH  
 1 ♠ Dble pass 2 NT  
 pass 2 NT all pass.

Opening lead: 8 ♠

South, the declarer, covered Ernie's open lead of the three of spades with the jack, which was

covered by Kay with the queen of spades, and declarer won the first trick with the ace. Most good declarers then played the deuce of clubs, hooked the jack, now played the king of clubs, on the next trick overtook the 10 of clubs and ran all the club tricks.

When the clubs were exhausted, declarer played a low heart which Ernie won with the ace and now played a small spade. Kay played her 10 of spades and returned the suit, defeating the contract.

ALL OTHER EAST players had found themselves with a problem, as the West hand played the king of spades; East, not wishing to block the suit, played the 10 of spades; and South made his contract.

Ernie knew that if South held the 10 of spades, he would have played low from dummy on the first trick, and if his wife held only two spades, she would have discarded her 10 of spades on a club.

My comment is a hand well-played with plenty of good thought.

History Lecturer To Be Introduced By Alumni Leader

Harold L. Kohlmeier, 744 Hazelwood, Birmingham, has been invited to introduce the guest speaker at the 18th annual Lewis Cass Lecture of the Detroit Historical Society at 8 p.m. Monday in the Detroit Historical Museum.

Kohlmeier is president of the Greater Detroit Miami University Alumni Association.

The lecturer will be Walter Havighurst, research professor of English, Miami University. His subject is "The Shadowed Name of Henry Hamilton" — Detroit Governor, 1776-1778.

Havighurst will deliver the lecture from the historic lecture room used by Lewis Cass when he was territorial governor in 1828. This lecture is included in the current museum exhibit, "Detroit's Colorful Heritage," which presents a brief picture of Detroit's past as seen through historical markers, paintings, prints and flags that have flown over the city.

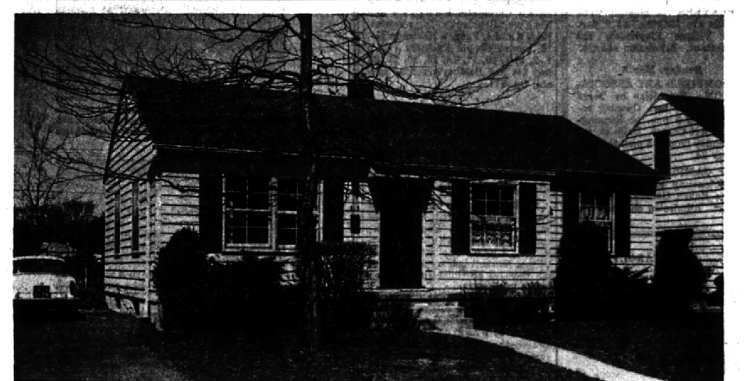

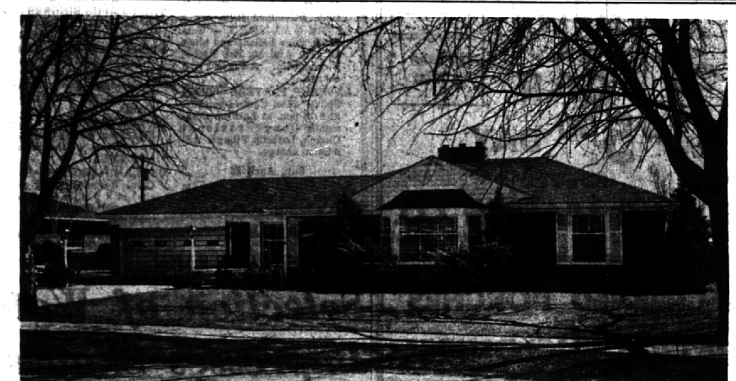
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
