### Stringfellow To Speak at Christ Church

William Stringfellow, author and outstanding Christian layman, will be guest speaker for the Episcopal Churchwomen of Christ Church Cranbrook, Bloomfield Hills, at the 10:45 a.m. meeting, May 5. He will complete his address following a luncheon intermission.

Widely known for his books "A Private and Public Faith," "Instead of Death" and "Free in Obedience," Stringfellow is a lawyer who also represents the Episcopal Church in the U.S.A. in the Faith and Order Commission of the World Council of Churches.

President of the student body and a national championship debater while doing his undergraduate work at Bates College, he went on to study at the London School of Economics under a Rotary Fellowship, and while there was president of the American Students Association. Earning a law degree from the University of Michigan, he was simultaneously taught at Tufts University.

HE SERVES as visiting lecturer in many law schools, including Notre Dame, Cornell and Ohio State; and at seminars of 12 denominations, along with such leading interdenominational seminars as Union Theological Seminary in New York, and the Divinity Schools of Harvard and Yale Universities.

Voted one of the "six young American theologians" in 1962, he was signally honored as the only layman invited to participate in public dialogue with Karl Barth during his lectures at the University of Chicago.

He has been a Special Deputy Attorney General of New York for election frauds, consultant to the New York State Commission Against Discrimination, and advisor to the New York State Council of Churches on legislative matters. Stringfellow will also be the speaker at the dinner meeting of the Men's Club of Christ Church Cranbrook on Monday, May 4, at 7 p.m.
