

Cranbrook Announces Fund Drive Leaders

W. Calvin Patterson, vice president of Michigan Telephone Co., has been named chairman of the general organization campaign for Cranbrook School's Decade of Development Program by William T. Gossett, chairman of the drive. Patterson's co-chairmen are James L. Schneider, vice president, Ross Roy, Inc.; John M. Sanders, president, Sanders Confectionery, Inc.; and James Holmes, vice president of H. P. Holmes, Inc., and president of the Cranbrook School Alumni Association.

These men and a corps of 200 volunteers will assist the school in meeting The Cranbrook Foundation challenge of \$1.5 million by raising \$1.5 million.

MORE THAN 1,000 alumni, parents and friends have been invited to attend a kick-off dinner at 7 p.m. Monday at the school. Patterson stated that he anticipates a good turnout for the event which will launch the school's greatest financial undertaking since its founding in 1927.

The \$3,000,000 effort will enable Cranbrook to have additional sources of income to increase faculty salaries and provide further masters' prerequisites, supplement he had lived for the past 10 years. While here, Mr. Stanford owned his own business, Stanford and Co. of Detroit. He attended the University of London and was a member of St. Alban's Episcopal Church in Auburndale, Fla.
