The purpose of the conference was to exchange ideas with older member schools and to introduce new ones.

Major speakers were Dr. Alvin W. Rose, Associate Professor of Sociology at Wayne State University, and Rabbi Sherwin Wine. Rabbi Wine will be the first Rabbi in the new Birmingham Temple.
