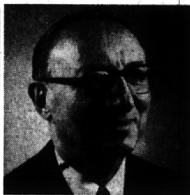
15 YEARS AGO

The State Highway Department has tentatively assigned a traffic signal for the 14 Mile-Woodward intersection, City Commissioner Bruce G. Booth revealed Monday evening at the City Commission meeting. Installation of the 14 Mile signal will climax a two-year-old campaign by The Birmingham Eccentric for additional safety measures for east-west traffic at this particular intersection, one of the most accident spots in Birmingham.

A survey group from the Birmingham Veterans Organization Monday evening agreed with the city commission that the gunnery hut projects should be taken down as soon as possible after the contract with the Federal Public Housing Authority (FPHA) expires Jan. 1, 1950. The group asked, however, that attempts be made to prevent extreme hardship cases, should there be any, from being tossed out of their living quarters at a certain specific date.

Birmingham's summer road-oiling program is to get an early start with the application of oil to gravel streets scheduled for permanent asphaltic topping as outlined in current assessment districts, City Manager Donald C. Egbert told the city commission Monday evening. Egbert pointed out that the oil applied would be a light type, not the heavier oil which will be used in the summer.
