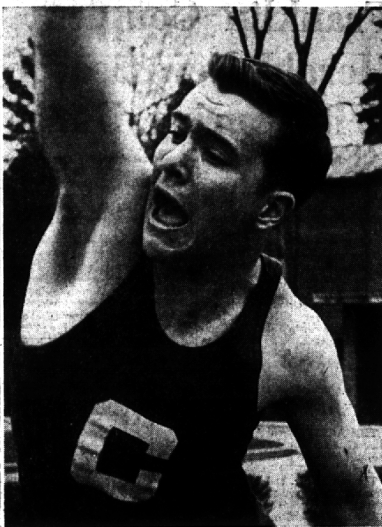
June Rites

### Summer High School Courses Scheduled

Seventh through 12th grade resident and nonresident students will have an opportunity to take summer school courses again this year.

The program will run from June 16 to Aug. 7 and classes will be held at Seaholm High School, Charles Buell, Seaholm English 1st is teacher, is director of the summer program.

All classes will meet for four hours a day, 8 a.m. to noon unless otherwise indicated. Courses to be offered are:

PHYSICAL EDUCATION: youth fitness for boys, ages 12-16. Registration is through the Elementary Summer School Program.

Science: biology, chemistry, with one additional four-hour session each week; general science; earth science (grade 7); earth science, grade 8.

Social studies: American government; international relations; modern European history; world history; social studies, grade 7; social studies, grade 8.

Business education: typing I, grades 9-12; junior high typing, grades 7-8; senior high typing, offered afternoons only.

FOREIGN LANGUAGE: French I, French II, Latin I, Spanish I, Spanish II, conversational French, 7-12; conversational Spanish, 7-12.

Industrial arts: printing, 2-6.

Language arts: English I, English II, English III, English, grade 7; English, grade 8; creative writing, 9-12; expository writing, 9-12; reading improvement and study skills for four weeks, grades 7-9 and 10-12; remedial reading, 7-12; speech I.

Mathematics: algebra I; algebra II; general mathematics; geometry; mathematics, grade 7; mathematics, grade 8; preparation for geometry.
