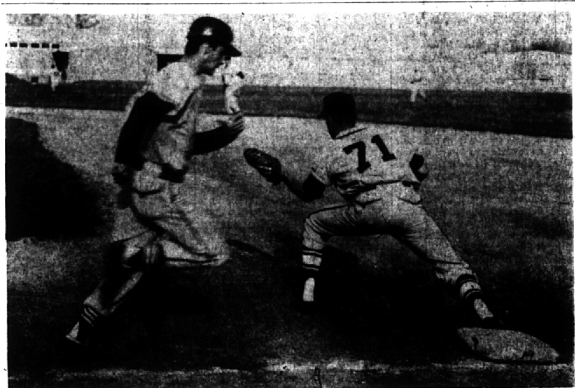


Seaholm Track Team Captures CMU Relays

Seaholm's baseball team, unable to get on the winning track, made seven errors en route to dropping a 9-4 decision to Cranbrook Friday.

The Maples took a 2-0 lead in the second inning but saw the Cranes score four times in the third inning with the help of an error and two wild pitches.

Maples Get 63rd Dual Meet Victory

Roseville threw a scare into Seaholm Tuesday but the Maples came away with their 63rd consecutive dual meet victory, although it wasn't certain until the final event was over.

Behind 16-2 after three events, Seaholm narrowed the gap as the meet progressed and entered the mile relay trailing, 65-51. It took an all-out effort by Bill Schoen to make up the difference on the final leg to keep the Maple string intact.

SEAHOLM MANAGED only six firsts, as George Day of Roseville swept the dashes. Ken Heft won the high hurdles in :15.5 and Jim Lyeis the low. Jim Thompson won the high jump at 5'9".

In the mile, Bill Bacheiler and Scott Bradley tied for honors at 4:42.3 and Pat Richardson and Jamie Dennis shared 880 laurels at 2:01.4. Roseville won the 880 relay, the 440, dashes, shot put and broad jump.

Schoen slammed the pole vault with Ken Evangelista, Ken Heft and Nick Boersma, the winner clearing 11'9". But, until Bill Schoen caught and passed his opponent on the anchor leg of the mile relay, it looked as if Seaholm's winning streak had been stopped. Schoen teamed with Larry Bell, Richardson and Dennis to win in 3:30.1.

SCOTT BRADLEY placed second in the mile run in 4:38 and Seaholm got another second when the sprint medley quartet of Dennis, Bell, Schoen and Jim Christensen bounded the course in 2:31.6.

Falcons Shatter 7 School Records in Ecorse Relays

Groves' track squad whipped North Farmington in a dual meet, 73-26, and then went on to break seven school records while placing third in the Ecorse Relays Saturday.

Falcon thinclocks took 10 firsts against North Farmington, their biggest opponent last season, and

garnered 31 points in the 25-team field at Ecorse.

The relays, won by the host school, saw Falcon runners shatter seven existing Groves' marks. Ecorse had 56 points to Ypsilanti's 54.

THE MILE relay team of Dennis Blanton, Steve Green, Tom White and Neil Granader placed sixth, setting a new school mark of 3:26.3, while Al Proctor, Floyd Cosmi, Green and Jeff Schubel placed third in the 880-relay with a new time of 1:32.6.

Groves' 440-sprint relay quartet of Schubel, Cosmi, Francois Derioz and Proctor tied for second in the new time of :44.8, while Derioz and Schubel teamed with Jim Samanen and Dave Frink to establish a new shuttle hurdle time of :59.7, good for third.

Frink ran a school-record time of :15.7 in the high hurdles and White, Proctor, Cosmi and Neil Granader set a new clocking of 2:31.3 in the spring medley.
