

Gov. Romney Boosts New 'People' Project

A telegram from Gov. George Romney congratulating the first organizational meeting of the Birmingham-Bloomfield chapter of the People-to-People program sparked the initial group meeting at the Aspen Road home of Mrs. Vaskey Nahabedian Monday night.

The second meeting will be held May 18 at The Birmingham Community House and will feature an international representative sent from the People-to-People main office in Kansas. Residents are invited to attend.

At the last meeting, Edward Baggerly of Bloomfield Hills, member of the steering committee, outlined the purposes of the international organization. He described the benefits of the direct personal contact program, to be developed by inviting foreign visitors directly into area homes, adult exchange of correspondence and organized trips to foreign countries.

"FRIENDSHIP between nations depends upon friendship between people. Governments can grant aid, negotiate, threaten and come to terms. But governments cannot force friendship and understanding between individuals.

"Only by individual action, and on a large scale, can understanding develop, and in time, to friendship between nations," said Baggerly.

Brent Nettie of Birmingham reviewed a State Department special report on the importance of direct personal contact.

"For the first time in the history of diplomacy, the active conduct of any aspect of a nation's foreign relations should lie in the hands of the people themselves and require their personal and direct participation," said Nettie.

for the fire department; \$5,500 for upkeep of municipal buildings; \$29,500 for sewer payments; \$13,000 for payment on sewer advances; and \$14,000 for retirement and social security.

OF incoming funds, \$248,800 will be from tax for operations; \$78,500 from tax for debt; \$31,500 from the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund; and \$21,100 from state shared taxes.

The assessed valuation for Bloomfield Hills is expected to jump from \$12,414,000 this fiscal year to \$15,529,000 in 1964-65.

While discussing the budget, the commission talked about the unfinished business of sewers for the remainder of the city.

It is estimated that the city will need \$158,000 to complete the sewer program for undeveloped areas of Bloomfield Hills.

Lone Pine, said he is "utterly opposed to the plot plan," which he contends would "destroy the entire character of the area."

"The residents in this area want to preserve the countrified atmosphere," he added.

Malloy said the homes he proposes to build would add to, not detract from, the appearance of the area.

The township board has until June 2 to act on the request for preliminary plan approval. After that date, the court could force the body to either approve or reject the petition.

Since the request was tabled, it will automatically be reviewed at the next regular meeting on May 25.

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ROBERT A. FRYE said Hubbell, Roth and Clark, the city's consulting engineers, "fell far short in their estimates that \$1 1/2 million would pay for the sewer program."

"We went to the citizens once, told them how much it would cost—now I hate to ask them for more money," he said.

James A. Berensford said he thought it would be wiser to raise the tax rate and make substantial payments to developers for sewers each year, rather than sell bonds and pay a high interest rate over 30 years.

Mayor Louis J. Colombo, Jr., suggested waiting until vacant areas are developed and have them pay the city for sewers, "instead of seeking present taxpayers for undeveloped land."

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Counties to Talk On Metro Goals

Citizens in the six county area (Oakland, Macomb, Monroe, St. Clair, Washtenaw and Wayne) have been urged to participate in the second annual conference on "Goals For Our Exploding Metro-Polis," sponsored by the Forum for Detroit Area Metropolitan Goals.

The full day conference at Cobo Hall Wednesday, June 2, will be conducted by speakers including Paul McCracken, professor of business conditions, School of Business Administration, University of Michigan; Joseph Ross, president of the Federal Department Stores, and national treasurer of ACTION, Inc.; Walter P. Reuther, president, United Auto Workers; Minoru Yamasaki, Minoru Yamasaki & Associates, Birmingham architects and engineers; Edward Connor, common council, City of Detroit; Thomas R. Reid, director of civic and governmental affairs, Ford Motor Company, and Paul H. Brown, forum president and vice president, Harley, Ellington, Cowin and Stirton, Inc., architects and engineers.

The Forum was established last year to attract citizens' attention to growth opportunities and to make the more than four million persons of the six counties aware that growth is their concern and that the least expensive way to approach growth problems is on a collective basis.

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
