Area Writers Honored in Nat'l Contest

Birmingham-Bloomfield area students have won 12 awards in the nation's largest creative writing competition for high school pupils. The local writing champions captured three fourth awards and nine honorable mentions in the 1964 Scholastic Writing Awards contest sponsored by Sheaffer Pen Co. and conducted by Scholastic Magazines of New York City.

Fourth-place winners were Anne Falke, 16, Seaholm, in the dramatic script division; and Howard Goldman, 17, and Robert Taggart, 17, Cranbrook, both in the informal article division.

HONORABLE mentions were given to Warren Swartz, Seaholm, informal article, and the following Cranbrook School students: Tom Cobb, 16, dramatic script and formal article; David Gilbert, 16, formal article; Goldman, poetry; Ben Thomas Henry, 16, dramatic script; Brad D. Host, 14, article; William Katzman, 15, poetry; and Peter H. Werbel, 16, formal article.

Winners of first, second, third and fourth awards will receive cash prizes and inscribed pens. Embossed merit certificates will be presented to all students.

Winners in this year's competition were chosen from entries from 2,469 schools in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, Marshall Islands, the Canal Zone, Canada, and from American-sponsored schools in Germany, Italy, Korea, Mexico and Venezuela.

MORE THAN 3200 teachers sent in the best work of their students for judging by 27 prominent authors and critics who receive their decisions on originality, quality of expression and writing skill.

The Writing Awards competition was established in 1925 to encourage creative writing by students in public, parochial or private senior and junior high schools. Prizes are awarded for the best original manuscripts in major categories of writing including short story, poetry, article and dramatic script.

Hills Jr. Choirs Join in Annual Spring Concert

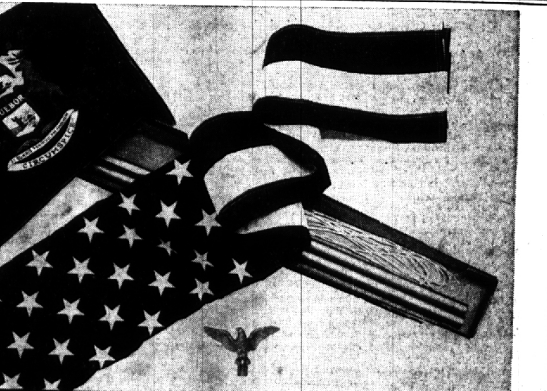
