Localite Hosts Mt. Holyoke Alums

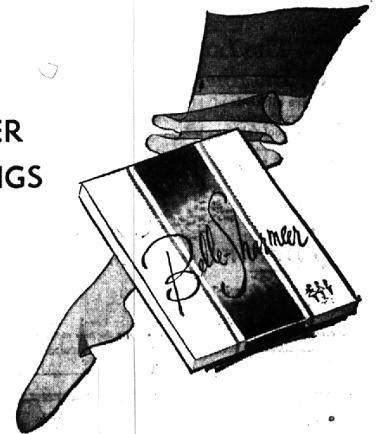
