### Proposed College Assured Support

Continuous tax support for the proposed Oakland County Community College if the issue passes at the June 8 school elections, is assured by new laws under the new constitution.

At a special meeting last week, the Oakland Board of Education passed a resolution that incorporates new legal provisions in its wording.

The most significant change removes the proposed tax from an increase of the 16-mill limitation. The community college tax would become charter millage not subject to expiration dates. Both property owners and nonproperty owners are eligible to vote.

LAST YEAR voters approved a proposition to establish the college, but turned down the tax-support question. Both questions must be approved if the college is to be established.

A third section to the community college proposition is the election of a six-member board of trustees.

### Anti-polio Chairmen Remind Residents of Second Appointment

Physicians of Oakland, Wayne and Macomb counties urge the 2 1/2 million persons who took polio vaccine on April 19 to remember to return for their second anti-polio sugar cube on Sunday, June 14.

Speaking for the tricity anti-polio immunization committees, Dr. Francis P. Rhoades, Wayne chairman, noted the project is only half completed and that a second feeding is necessary to insure maximum protection against poliovirus. Dr. Robert Bookmyer and Dr. Worth W. Henderson, co-chairmen of Oakland County, and Dr. Gerald Morris, chairman for Macomb County, said their counties plan similar actions.

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### YOUR GARDEN CENTER

AS IT APPLIES TO YOUR  
LAWN, GARDEN, TREES & SHRUBS

REMINDERS:

1. Just because your tree is 50 ft. tall is no indication that it does not need feeding.
2. Just because your flowering shrubs and trees are in full bloom now does not mean that you should deny them food. You must think of next year.
3. Just because your lawn is beautiful right now does not mean that it does not need food.
4. Just because your forsythia and other flowering shrubs are in full bloom does not mean they are not hungry.

NOTE: When your child is growing by leaps and bounds and is radiant, beautiful and active DO YOU RE-THINK THE AMOUNT YOU FEED THEM? Both plants and children respond to NATURAL NEEDS—AND ONE IS FOOD.

SUGGESTIONS:

1. If you have not fertilized your lawn this year you should apply 1 pound of nitrogen to 1000 sq. ft. of area.
2. If you have a lot of dandelions and other broadleaf weeds try a WEED and FEED product.
3. A high NITROGEN fertilizer is best for trees and shrubs and grass. Use at this time a 16-8-8 or 20-10-5.
4. An extra dose of SUPER-PHOSPHATE (20-0-0) will help produce blooms on dogwood, flowering crab, forsythia, weigalia, etc. (Too late now for some of these so put it down in your log book. We have some nice log books for this purpose.)

MISCELLANEOUS:

Flower gardens will respond if they are in a nice sandy-loam and are fed properly. A fine starter is DRICURE, a mixture of poultry, cattle manure and peat moss. It gives texture to the soil plus a mild starter. Follow this up with a chemical garden fertilizer such as STADLER'S 4-12-4 (4 lbs. to 100 sq. ft.) or AGRICO'S 8-16-8 (2 lbs. to 100 sq. ft.). In a new bed you may dig these in BEFORE you plant.

LAWNS:

Keep watching the grass blades for signs of tiny yellow and brown spots. Call us if they are present because this is a fungus problem and MUST be taken care of immediately!

If MUGHO PINE candles begin to shed pollen it is time to spray ALL PINES for control of PINE LEAF SCALE. ON SPRUCE, if there is a swelling (particularly the central stem of the 3-stemmed branch tip), you MUST SPRAY with DDT.

ALL BULBS should be fed BEFORE or DURING bloom with a 4-12-4 at 4 lbs. to 100 sq. ft., or 8-16-8 at 2 lbs. to 100 sq. ft. When flowers have passed DO NOT CUT OFF OR BRAID THE FOLIAGE because they are the only means of producing new bulbs for next year.

SLUGS: If you have them lay a board or shingle by the plant. In the morning lift the cover and—ugh—kill the slugs. (Hope you had breakfast before this.) Actually a BETTER METHOD is to scatter a SLUG BAIT around the plants. It will not attract birds or pets.
