

Census Bureau To Survey Second Jobs

Three area residents will take part in the May population survey conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau's office in Detroit.

The questions are designed to provide information on the number of persons who have more than one job.

Information will be collected on the type of work done on a second job compared with the regular job, the number of hours worked at the second job and whether the work was done at night or on weekends.

THE SURVEY will be conducted here and in 356 other sample areas of the country next week.

Census Bureau interviewers who will collect information locally include: Carol Barry and Pearl McCahill, Southfield, and Mary Heck, Franklin.

Birmingham area churches will add a religious flavor to Centennial-Michigan Week on Sunday, Spiritual Foundation Day. Ministers of the Birmingham Council of Churches, headed by Dr. Homer J. Armstrong of First Baptist, have set aside May 17 as a day to observe the celebration of Michigan Week and the Birmingham Centennial.

It was suggested by the Council that all ministers preach on the subject "Our Spiritual Heritage As A Community" at one or more services Sunday and to observe the subject in their church schools and youth activities.

Several area churches will have lay speakers in the pulpit to speak on some aspect of "Spiritual Heritage." Others will take time to recognize the day during services.

YOUTH GROUPS in the various churches are scheduling special services for Sunday evening, at which time some of the older members of each congregation will relate historical incidents in the life of the community and its churches. During regular Sunday services, ministers have been asked to read letters in the pulpit from former residents who have moved from the area.

Each church will set up an exhibit of historical significance in its building. Committees assembled from the various churches will create the displays and immediately following the Sunday morning services, the congregations will be invited to view the exhibits.

The church displays will be on view in each building throughout Centennial Week. The general public is invited to visit the churches from 2-3 p.m. Sunday. During the week, people may observe the exhibits any day.

"THE CHURCH displays will consist of old church records, pulpit bibles, pictures of former ministers and buildings and other interesting historical aspects of each church's life in the community," Dr. Armstrong said.

In addition to displays set up in the church buildings, some congregations will assemble exhibits in shop windows along Maple. These will also be ready to view by Sunday Spiritual Foundation Day.

Police to Close Downtown Streets For Centennial

The various Centennial-Michigan Week activities have created the necessity of closing several streets in Birmingham's downtown area during the observance.

Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley said during the run of the Village Fair Merrill east of Bates through the Henrietta intersection will be closed.

On Tuesday Henrietta will be closed from Maple to the Kresge parking lot from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. for the Newcomers Club-Hospitality Day celebration.

No streets will be closed for Saturday's parade Moxley said but traffic will be re-routed through the downtown area during the day.
