Ginny Schaefer's Classes Exhibit Their Creativity

For nearly 18 years Ginny Schaefer (Mrs. Paul) has shared and spread her creative enthusiasm by teaching art classes at the Community House, Birmingham. This Sunday, May 17, her students and friends, as well as the general public, are invited to see an exhibition of her works on display at the Community House from 12 noon to 5 p.m. The show includes more than 50 pieces showing the range of approach that she also encourages in her students. Mrs. Schaefer teaches two children's classes, three adult classes

and art appreciation classes. In all The Community House offers 28 adult classes ranging from sewing and decoupage to "Civilization of Ancient Greece" and "The Drama as a Political Institution" offered by Oakland University instructors.

PERPETUATING an interest in art is automatic for Mrs. Schaefer who comes from a line of art enthusiasts. "Whenever it rained we got pushed up to the dining room table with a paint box," she says. "And if we didn't want to paint that day, we didn't dare ask our mother why to do because that's what she always suggested."

Mrs. Schaefer's grown daughter and son-in-law are painters too. Most of the students in her classes are young newly-marrieds with a few small children and an eagerness to express themselves. There are men, too, and housewives, mothers, all the assorted categories that people come in, and Mrs. Schaefer is their guide.

MRS. SCHAEFER studied at the Art Academy in Philadelphia and Mayor Booth in Chicago. Her work was included in the government building exhibition program in Washington inaugurated by Mrs. Kennedy. The program showed works by American regional artists in a changing show. You will recognize Virginia Schaefer at her show Sunday by finding a slender, attractive woman who is probably the most cheerful one there.

He's Man Behind Music For Guild's 'Brigadoon'

Bob Bates, Detroit area musical director and accompanist, will serve as music director of "Brigadoon," to be presented by St. Dunstan's Guild in the Cranbrook Theatre June 4, 5 and 6 and 11, 12 and 13. Bates' musical experience ranges over the classical, semiclassical and popular music fields and includes New York night club appearances at the piano, accompanist for choral groups, summer stock, and music department head at several schools. The musical "Brigadoon" calls for a large cast, with both the male and female leads singing parts, as are a majority of the supporting leads—plus singing and dancing by the chorus.

BATES WAS A music major at Harvard and is now choirmaster at Christ Church Cranbrook, Bloomfield Hills; is accompanist for the Orpheus Club of Detroit; and has private piano students. He formerly headed music departments at Avon School in Connecticut and at Cranbrook School

and for the last 10 summer seasons has worked with the Barnstormers Theater in Tamworth, N. H., one of the country's oldest summer stock theatres. His career also includes five years in New York during which time he was featured at the piano in various night spots and spent more than a year in musical production with the Shuberts. "Brigadoon" is one more of a series of musicals Bates has worked on. His past shows in the Birmingham-Bloomfield area include "The Bloomfield Eccentrics," staged by St. Dunstan's for standing-room-only audiences several years ago, and the musicals put on during the Bloomfield Art Association festivals the last two years.
