**County Kennel Club Sponsors Dog Show**

More than 1,000 dogs representing 100 breeds will be judged at the Oakland County Kennel Club all-breed dog show Sunday in the Detroit Artillery Armory, 15000 West 8 Mile Rd.

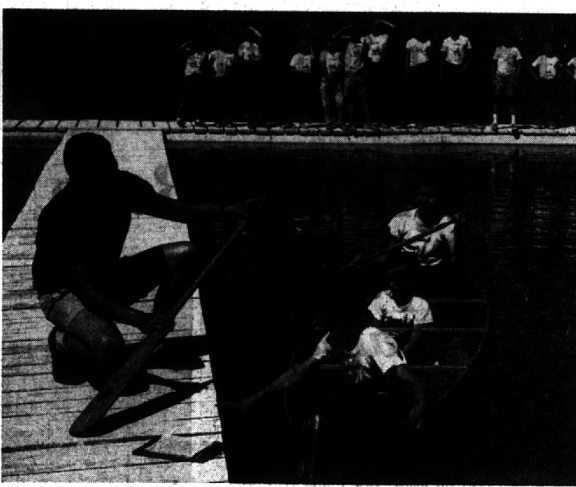
In addition to judging the best dogs in these breeds, and other competitions leading up to the best dog in the show, which continues from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m., standard obedience trials will also take place.

SOME of the other clubs involved include the American Shetland Sheepdog Association, the Doberman Spottman's Club of Detroit, the Michigan Boxer Club, the Michigan English Setter Club, the Irish Setter Club of Michigan and the Michigan Brittany Club.

Others are the English Springer Spaniel Club of Michigan, the Weimaraner Club of America, the Bassett Hound Club of Greater Detroit, the Norwegian Elkhound Association of Michigan, the Midwest Collie Club, the Great Dane Club of Michigan and the Poodle Club of Southeast Michigan.

An unusual feature of this year's show: The Amateur Mendicant Society, a Sherlock Holmes study club, will examine all 1,000 dogs with an attempt to find the dog most like the famous Hound of the Baskervilles which Holmes tracked down and dispatched.

THE OWNER of the dog thus selected will be presented with a special plaque, an authentic facsimile of the original footprint of the gigantic hound taken from the files of Scotland Yard.

**Canoe Guide Available**

Free copies of a streamlined guide for canoeists are now available from the Conservation Department's Publications in Lansing.

The publication is "Michigan Canoe Trails," a joint effort of the Department and Michigan Tourist Council, which lists 59 easy-to-hard canoe runs on the state's streams.

REPRINTED in a convenient pocket-sized form, it outlines these canoeing routes on a map of Michigan, also showing landings, camping places, portages and other features.

Each run is described in a short sketch which guides the canoeist from start to finish, telling him the length of his trip and tough spots he will encounter along the way. Supply points and fishing opportunities are also noted.

The Department also announced that Michigan ranked third nationally in hunting and fishing popularity last year with a total of nearly 1,765,000 license-buying sportsmen.

FOR the fifth year running, this state placed No. 2 in four numbers, behind leader Pennsylvania. Almost 860,600 gunners and archers bought 1,142,745 licenses.
