CHILDREN'S SWIM CLASSES

The elementary children's swimming classes will end at Barston and Derby pools on Saturday, May 23, and at Southham pool on June 6. Tests will be given on the last day of classes and certificates will be awarded to those who pass. More than 600 children are entered in the spring series of classes at the three pools.

Group Offers Sailing Class

The American Youth Hostels will offer a basic sailing class beginning Sunday at Kent Lake in Kensington Metropolitan Park. The 18-hour course includes a dock-side lecture in sailing theory and boat handling instruction aboard the AYH fleet of seven Interlake Sloops.

THE COURSE is designed for adults and young people who lack previous sailing experience and serves as an introduction to the AYH program. Those who complete the course may become AYH skippers. More than 500 beginners have received training in the last three years.

Spring Trout Plantings Set

Large-scale plantings of legal trout have been launched by the Conservation Department this month to make up for nature's shortcomings in lakes and streams of northern Michigan.

During May and June, Department workers will release 127,000 keeper-size brook, brown and rainbow trout in the Upper Peninsula and another 350,000 fish in the Northern Lower Peninsula.

THE PLANTINGS are timed to produce best angler returns and are for the most part, pinpointed at waters where there is little or no natural trout reproduction.

Waters in the southern half of the Lower Peninsula will be stocked with nearly 40,000 take-home trout during the next few weeks, following up the Department's pre-season plant of 100,000 fish in this part of the state.

The Birmingham Little League "Continental-Badgers," champions in 1963, successfully opened this season with a 5-0 win over the Falcons.

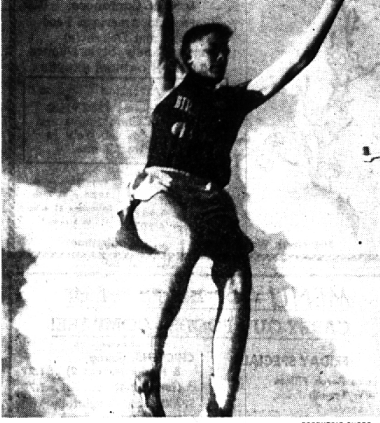
Newcomer Dean Nieman, along with holdovers Chuck Gilman and George Zappel, led the attack with two hits apiece.

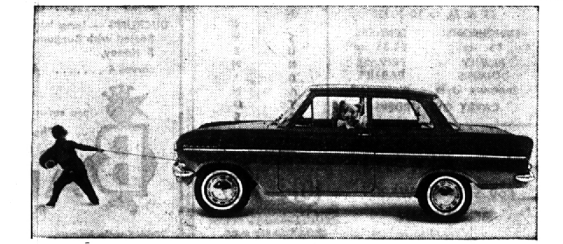
