Thomas L. Hanna, one of the prominent merchants of the village, interrupted his shoe business here to join the Klondike Gold Rush.

Following the trail of prospectors to the Klondike, Hanna went to Nome, Alaska, where he lived several years before he returned to Birmingham and resumed his shoe business which was located on the northwest corner of Woodward and Maple avenues. He died in 1931 at the age of 76.
