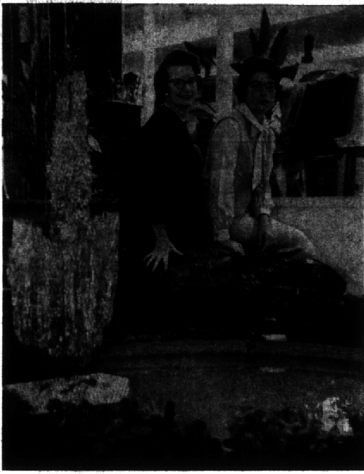

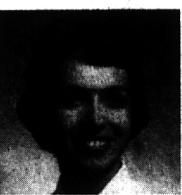
The visitors arrived Thursday and stayed through Sunday, their program for fun pegged "teen-ager" all the way!

Since 1937, Mr. Nickell has been catching and banding birds of Michigan on the grounds of Cranbrook Institute of Science. He has identified more than 300 different species. In doing this he has probably learned more about the habits of Michigan birds than any other person.
