

U.S. Leaders Topic Of Area Man's Talk

James Beauchamp (Champ) Clark, the Bethany College graduate who almost became U.S. President in 1912, and Woodrow Wilson, the man who did, continued growing in stature as seen from the perspective of history.

So commented Draper Allen, public affairs leader and former businessman of Birmingham, recently at Bethany College. This convention was the second annual in a series of addresses by Allen on American public affairs leaders, on American public affairs leaders.

"Both Wilson and Clark are growing in stature as time goes on," Allen said. He cited tributes from distinguished historians and political figures, including former Secretary of State Cordell Hull.

ALLEN SAID that Clark—a congressman during 1893-96 and 1897-1901 and Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives during 1911-1919—was characterized by several outstanding attitudes, a achievements, and aspirations, including:

• An outstanding progressive record.

• Championing of human rights and liberties.

• Patriotism which placed national welfare above personal in-

terest or sectional interests. The spirit of standing fast in his beliefs and principles.

• His thorough knowledge of politics.

ALLEN, THE owner of an extensive library of American, long has been interested in American public affairs. His interest in the movement in the early years of this century. A portrait of Clark, which was presented by him to his friend, the late William Jennings Bryan, was turned by him to the college. Clark was graduated from Bethany in 1873.

In his address, "This Nearly Was His—The Epic Defeat of Champ Clark," Allen devoted a large part of his remarks to the events leading up to and following the 1912 Democratic National convention. Clark had the majority of votes on several consecutive ballots for the presidential nomination at that convention in 1912, but at that time—and until 1936—a two-thirds majority was needed to win the nomination. But William Jennings Bryan—a Nebraska delegate, who was later to be Wilson's Secretary of State—helped swing the nomination to Wilson.

"PROBABLY NO Democratic national convention has been more extensively written about than the famous one which defeated Champ Clark," Allen said.

"Had Speaker Clark been able to devote more personal attention to his 1912 convention candidacy it is probable he would not have permitted William Jennings Bryan, the delegate from Nebraska, to make the adroit maneuver he did which the Wilson forces, on the scene at Baltimore, were quick to seize upon to the advantage of their candidate.

"But the conscientious speaker, preoccupied as he was with official duties, for congress was still in

session, refused to go to Baltimore to take personal management of his campaign. His refusal probably cost him the nomination which that year proved to be the prize of a golden apple."

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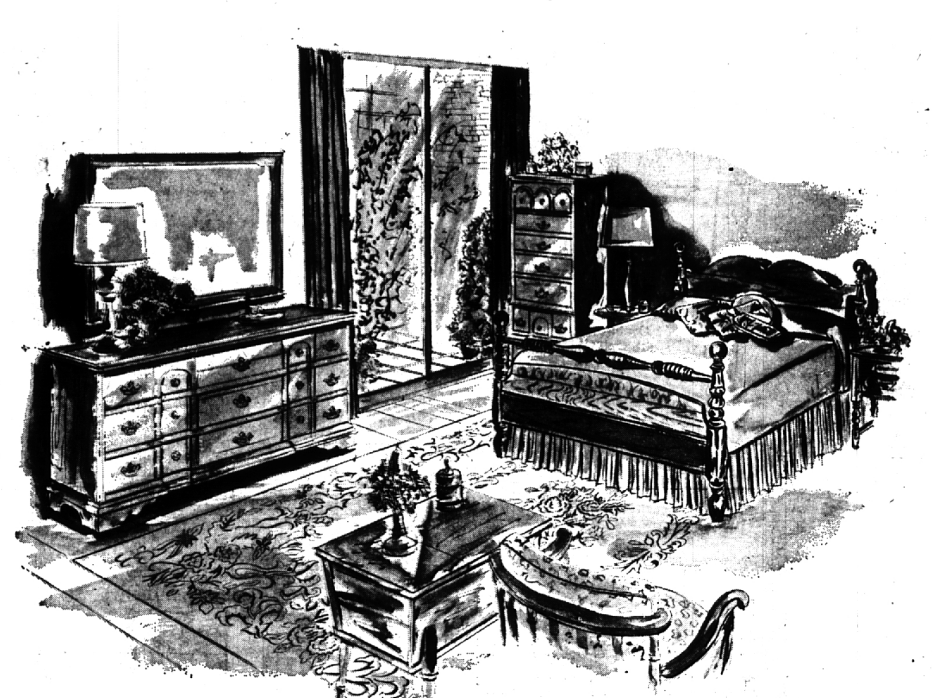
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
