 lamp and chest as attractive back-grounds.
 At JACOBSON'S five front windows are turned out in central style. Each presents a mannequin in modern dress, behind an ornate gold picture frame. Hung from boards are small framed photographs of old Birmingham, borrowed from the collection of the Manley Bailey Funeral Home. The Bloomfield Fashion Shop "Salutes the Birmingham Centennial — 1864-1964" with a window showing two mannequins in old-fashioned white embroidered dresses.

One is framed by an oval border of roses. The other leans against a large spinning wheel. At Moss Florist a mannequin is dressed for a walk on a garden path, wearing a white blouse, blue print skirt and carrying a print jacket and blue beaded bag. A beige shawl covers her head. A picket fence, green grass and white stone path comprises the setting.

THE WILSON DRUG exhibit in a large window facing woodward, is centered by a color portrait of Ralph Wilson, founder of the company in 1923. Behind prescriptions from Cobb and Cobb, Shain's and other early Birmingham "drug and grocery" stores are seen, along with bottles, scales, mortar and pestle and old pictures provided by the Manley Bailey Funeral Home. The R B Shops has used old-fashioned furniture and accessories in three windows, to contrast with present-day fashions shown.

May 21 Slated For Poppy Day

Poppy Day in Birmingham is slated for May 21 by the Charles Edwards Post, Birmingham-Troy branch of the American Legion. Funds from the one-day sale will enable the Legion and its auxiliary to meet the needs of disabled veterans and families of deceased servicemen.

Wearing of the poppy has become the symbol of the servicemen who died during both World War and the Korean conflict.

On Merrill, the Consumers Power Co. has windows showing "Washing Yesterday and Today" and "Water Heating Yesterday and Today," both with old and new appliances. Also shown is an old range. At Detroit Edison Co. there's a small model of Birmingham's Old Mill, with a water wheel that turns. To complete the tour I drove by Chudik's where I'd heard a Ruth Shain window is being featured. "Birmingham's Great Lady"—Mrs. Shain sets the theme dramatically.

An open house at the City and Country School of Bloomfield Hills has been planned by the faculty for Sunday from 2 to 5 p.m. Residents are invited to visit the school for gifted children from kindergarten through junior high school grades, and an informal tour of the premises will be guided by students. G. A. Rooper, headmaster of the school, will speak on the education program of the school, located at 2190 N. Woodward, one-half mile north of Long Lake Road.

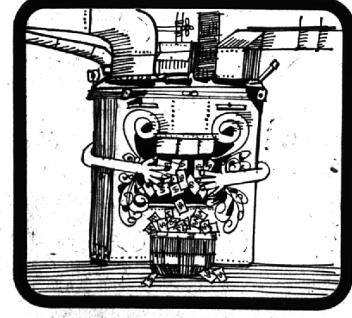
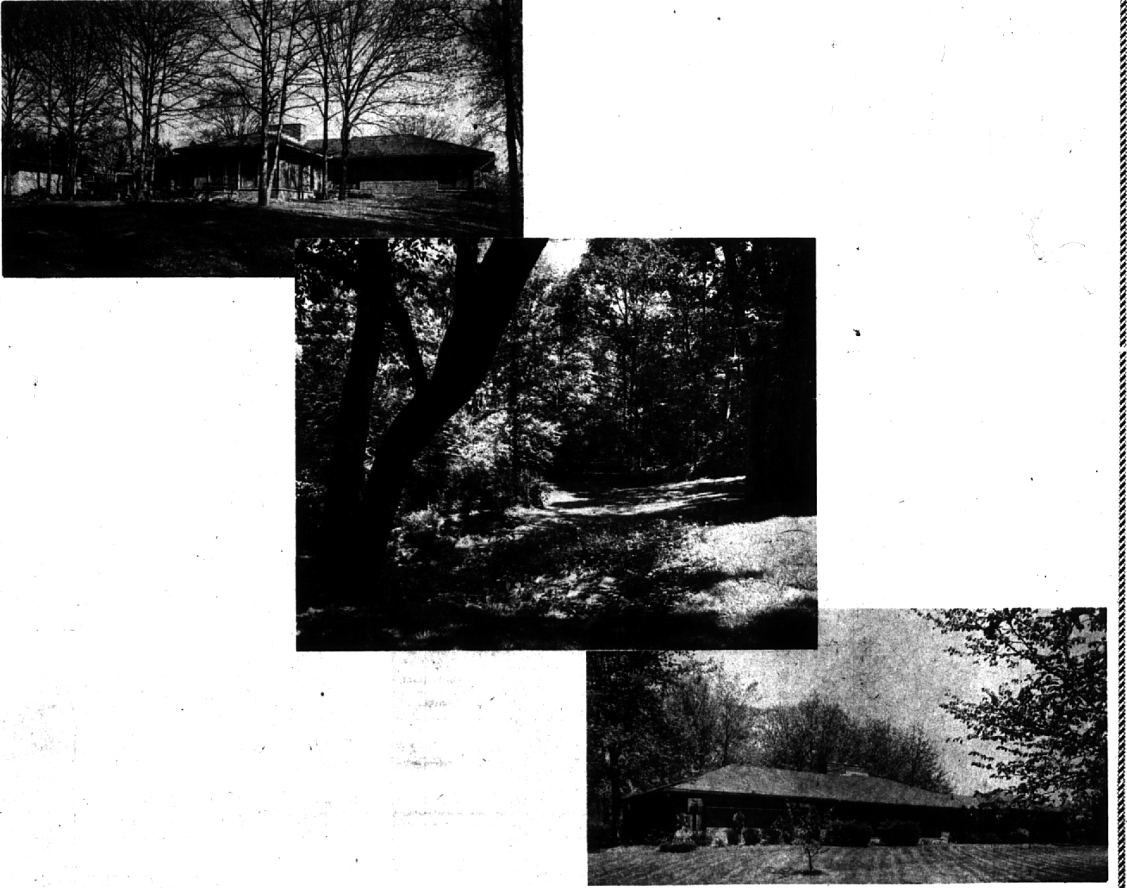
