### 6 Area Schools Qualify Athletes for State Meet

High school track teams from around Michigan congregated at regional sites Saturday to decide the representatives for the big state meet Saturday at Ann Arbor.

Seaholm and Cranbrook captured regional championships, the Maples winning Class A at Thurston, the Cranes taking Class B honors at the same location.

Four other area schools, Groves, Bloomfield Hills, Brother Rice and Detroit Country Day will send athletes to their respective finals by virtue of the performances over the weekend.

**THE MAPLES** qualified 10 for the State Class A finals in Ann Arbor, while Groves qualified in four events, Bloomfield Hills in two and Brother Rice in one.

In Class B finals, scheduled at East Lansing on the campus of Michigan State University, Cranbrook will be competing in seven events.

Detroit Country Day, competing in regional competition at Detroit Pershing, qualified in three events for the finals of Class C, to be held at Mt. Pleasant.

**THE FIRST** three places in each event qualified for the state. Both Seaholm and Groves placed in the 880-relay. The Maple quartet of Ken Heft, Dan Edson, John Kingscott and Howard Dubin were second, while Groves' team of Al Proctor, Floyd Cosmi, Steve Green and Jeff Schabel was third.

The mile run saw three area runners qualify. Bob Richards of Bloomfield won the event, followed by Seaholm's Jim Olson and Jamie Deans.

Ken Heft of Seaholm earned a trip to Ann Arbor in both hurdles, winning the highs and placing second to Groves' Jeff Schabel in the lows. Schabel will also travel.

Bill Schoen and Pat Richardson of Seaholm were one-three in the 880. Accompanying them will be Bloomfield's Tom Kearney, who was second.

**KINGSCOTT AND RICE's** Paul Mason qualified in the 440 and Al Proctor met the requirements in both dashes. In field events, Seaholm's Ken Evangelista was third

in the pole vault and Rick Snyder placed second in the shot put. Cranbrook outran St. Joseph to win its competition. The Cranes qualified Arch Copeland in the 220, Jeff Hips in the 440 and Paul Shank and Chip Brethen in the pole vault.

The Crane mile relay of Dave Craig, Greg Dearth, Bruce Hunter and Hips qualified as did the 880-relay of Craig, Tom Love, Dearth and Copeland. Tom Van Horn will compete in the high jump and John Kopchick in the shot.

**COUNTRY DAY's** Gary Grimes passed the test in the high jump and John Swain in the mile. The mile relay team of Paul Sonda, Matt Kubiak, Grimes and Swain dropped the baton but still finished first to qualify in 3:45.7.

## Add 5 Foreign Golfers To Carling World List

Five more foreign golfers have qualified to play in the first annual Carling World Golf Championship at Oakland Hills Country Club, East (Zone 5). First players from Aug. 27-30.

The latest additions raise to 12 the number of foreign golfers who have qualified for the \$200,000 Carling World Golf Championship. Ultimately, at least 45 players representing world zones outside the United States and 105 American contestants will compete at Oakland Hills for the \$35,000 jackpot prize.

**MORE THAN 350** entries have been filled by U.S. players to date, with 10 PGA tournaments serving as domestic qualifying events. All but three of the eight foreign zones have now filled at least a portion of the places allotted to them.

The three foreign zones still to go are Canada (Zone 2), Great Britain qualified in the first annual Carling World Golf Championship at Oakland Hills Country Club, East (Zone 5). First players from Aug. 27-30.
