Municipal Court funds, rubbish collection and cemetery fees should raise another \$593,788.

Included in the budget is \$21,000 for adjustments in wages for city employees. Another \$16,000 has been set aside for fringe benefits.

All City workers not presently covered will begin receiving overtime pay for all hours worked over 40. The rate will be one-and-a-half times the normal hourly rate.

The overtime will especially affect the police department where the men were required to take equal time off in order to compensate for overtime.

THE ADOPTED budget also calls for the hiring of six new employees. Three of them, including a detective, will be assigned to the police department.

Another will be added to the forestry department, building inspection department and a part-time job in the street maintenance department will become full-time.

The increase in the size of the police department is due primarily to the increase in Birmingham's crime rate, which jumped 30 percent during the past year.

A total of \$476,000 has been set aside for capital improvements in the new budget. About \$112,600 of this amount is a carry-over from the previous year's program.

INCLUDED in the capital improvements are several major projects that involve construction of the peripheral route.

These are the widening of Chester Street, straightening of the City of Woodward and intersection and it is hoped progress can be made toward widening Oakland from Hunter to Woodward.

Successful Family Want Ad Plan

Group Makes Offer To Reimburse Owner

Members of the Birmingham Taliaferro Estates Association were expected to offer to reimburse Manley Bailly for taxes he paid on commercial property in the subdivision this week in an effort to have the property rezoned to residential.

The Birmingham Plan Board has recommended the property, along West Maple near Larchlea, be rezoned from its present business classification to residential.

Bailly has objected to the rezoning on the grounds he has had to pay business taxes on the land since 1937 and also has paid a special assessment for the widening on Maple.

The property owners want the land rezoned to residential, contending the surrounding area is zoned and developed in a residential manner.

TWO WEEKS ago the city commission adjourned a hearing on the rezoning to allow time for the property owners and Bailly to work out some type of agreement.

Attorney James E. Nichols, representing Taliaferro Estates, says his group has pledged a total of \$6,400 to give to Bailly.

"This is an attempt to repay Mr. Bailly for the commercial taxes he has paid on the property and to reimburse him for his assessment on the widening of Maple," Nichols said.

The money was pledged by the members of the association, he said. The amount of pledges ranged from \$100 to \$200.

The offer, Nichols said, would be presented to Bailly this week and at a public hearing before the commission Monday night.

Bailly said Wednesday morning he had not received any offer from the association as yet and was not in a position to discuss the matter.

Lathrup Opens Bid For Garbage Pickup

Two separate bids on garbage pickup in Lathrup Village will be determined at the June 22 meeting of the City Council.

The first bid will be for a supplemental collection on a bi-monthly basis to begin July 1 and run until September 20. This will increase the pickup to a weekly basis, as provided for in the city's new budget.

The second bid will combine this supplemental pickup with the current rate of collection, due to expire on Sept. 20. This bid will include a two-year contract with a one-year option for collection on a weekly basis to begin Sept. 20 when present contracts will have expired.

City officials have not determined a specific rubbish pickup day.
