

Maples Still EML Champions

Seaholm celebrated its sixth place finish in the State Class A track meet at Ann Arbor Saturday by walloping Royal Oak Kimball in a dual meet Tuesday, 73-35.

The victory was number 66 in a row for coach Kermit Ambrose and his Maples over a period of 11 years in the EML and enabled Seaholm to repeat as league dual champs.

Only two schools have defeated Seaholm in dual meets over that period of time. One of them, Cranbrook, made a fine showing in the state Class B finals at East Lansing, winding up in a tie for eighth place.

competition included Bloomfield Hills' fine miler, Bob Richards, who shook off the challenges of Redford's Art Link and Farmington's Dennis Hunt to post the winning time of 4:17.3.

Battle Creek Central won the Class A title, garnering 28 points, to nose out Flint Central. Seaholm totaled 14 points and Bloomfield Hills had 10 points, good for a tie in ninth place.

In the mile, which Richards won, Seaholm's Jim Olson and Jamie Dennis battled through the race for fourth place, with Olson coming in eight-tenths of a second ahead of his teammate.

Ken Heft of Seaholm earned a sixth in the low hurdles at :15.1 and then finished seventh in the

high hurdles at :19.9. He also ran a leg on the school's 880-relay. Bill Schoen placed fourth in the 880 with a time of 1:58.4.

IN CLASS B, won by Willow Run, Cranbrook totaled 11 points. The Crane mile relay team of Greg Dearth, Dave Craig, Arch Copeland and Jeff Hippa set a new school record of 3:27.7, good for second place. Their time topped the winning Class A time in the same event.

The Granes also earned a third in the 880-relay with Dearth, Tom Love, Hippa and Copeland combining for a 1:31.5 clocking.

But, Seaholm, tuning up for the Oakland dual meet Friday night, took over the role they are more

accustomed to this year against Kimball Monday—the role of winner.

They won both relays. The 880-relay of Heft, Dan Edson, John Kingscott and Howard Rubin was first in 1:33.2, while the mile relay of Kingscott, Larry Bell, Jamie Dennis and Schoen won in 3:31.2.

JIM OLSON, Bill Bachelier and Scott Bradley were the first three across the line in the mile, Olson winning in 4:35.7. Pat Richardson won the 880 in 2:00.1 and Bill Schoen took the 440 in the time of :51.8.

Ken Heft was again a double winner, winning the 100 in :10.3 and the low in :21.2. Jim Olson, medalist honors in the tournament.

Seaholm's Jim Kirwan had an 81, Troy Heiberger-79, Gary Kirwan-82, and Jim Herman-87.

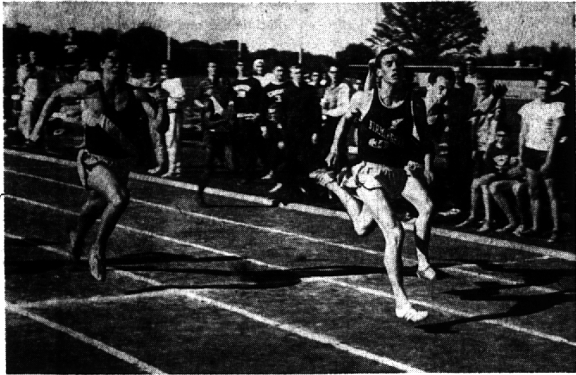

A Yank at Cambridge won the triple jump in the Oxford, Cambridge track meet held May 9, shattered a 41-year-old record for the long jump (broad jump to Americans) and landed on the pages of the Manchester Guardian and Daily Herald.

He is James Lewis Axtell, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Hallas of Pine Lake. Jim married Susan Hallas in Kirk in the Hills last summer and the couple lives in Cambridge where Jim, Yale '63, is studying for his Ph. D. at Trinity College.

HIS WINNING triple jump measured 47' 7". His long jump of 20' 1 1/2" is the best of five inches the previous best record held for 41 years by Harold Abrahams, treasurer of the British Amateur Athletic Board and one-time Olympic champion.

Jim said the secret of his success is his wife. "I've put on 15 pounds since we were married last August. Extra weight can be mighty useful in the long jump," he said.

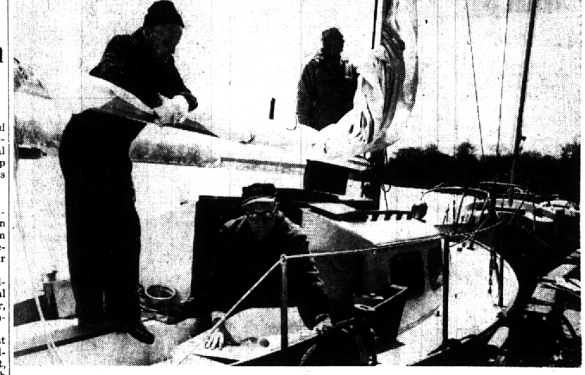

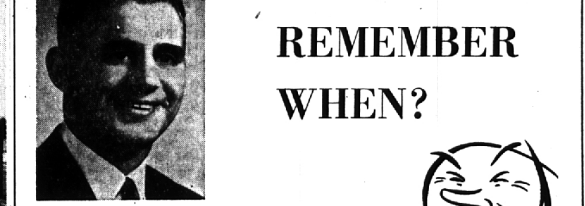
