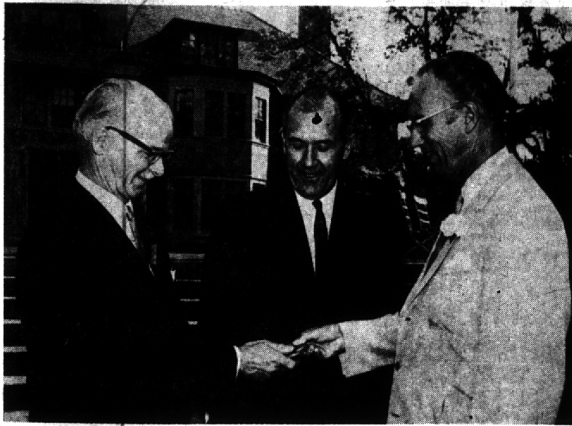


Cranbrook Cites 3 Developers

Troopers Mark May Water Safety Month

The State Police are giving special emphasis to two safety slogans—"A Captain for Every Ship" and "A Lifeguard for Every Family"—as part of their contribution to Michigan's Water Safety Education Month during May, said Sgt. John Amthor, commander of the Pontiac post.

Though water safety is a year-around concern for the State Police, the special efforts are in conjunction with Gov. George Romney's proclamation for the month which marks the start of increased outdoor water activities.

Explaining the slogans, Sergeant Amthor said that State Police analysis of Michigan's 640 water accidents last year which killed 244 persons and injured 216 others indicated that more responsible supervision by boat operators, parents and other adults could have cut the toll appreciably in boating and nonboating accidents.

capable supervision with provision for effecting rescue if trouble develops. Persons in that age group accounted for 85 per cent of the 156 drownings in Michigan nonboating accidents in 1958.

Because accidents may happen despite the best of safety intentions, Sergeant Amthor urged that boat operators and at least one family member know how to apply some method of resuscitation. Sixteen lives were reported saved in state water accidents last year because someone was able to revive the victims.

"By taking sensible precautions before taking part in any outdoor water activities, we can help make Michigan a water safety wonderland," Sergeant Amthor stressed.

COPIES of the Governor's proclamation, posters, and other water safety information are on display at State Police posts, he said.

The department's participation in the program also is being supported by press and radio-TV and officers are giving water safety talks to public gatherings.

The department's water safety efforts will continue throughout the year.

FRANKLIN—A new State of Michigan flag will symbolize the real spirit of Exchange Day in the Franklin Village office. And so will its companion, the token key to the Village of Blissfield.

Both items were presented to Franklin Village President Richard Oberschulte and Councilman Robert Winkel as guests Monday (May 27).

The official state flag was presented by State Senator Elmer R. Porter.

The key, representing the friendly hospitality that characterized the day's program, was presented by the Blissfield Village Council.

AT A special meeting of the Franklin council Monday night, Oberschulte reported that the entire day was a gratifying and enlightening experience. The party of four from Franklin, which included Mrs. Oberschulte and Mrs. Winkel, were welcomed with a police escort and a school band. A special council meeting was held in their honor following luncheon they were given a tour of the small but thriving community, whose population is almost the same as Franklin's; 2,700 residents.

"We were treated so royally by Blissfield, we began to worry if their visiting mayor, Arnold Gasior and Mrs. Parker, would be having as good a time in Franklin," said Oberschulte.

THE SPECIAL meeting was called Monday night to review the conditions of plans and specifications for 1964 road contracts which will open for bids May 28.

Organized opposition to discontinuance of Grand Trunk Western's overnight through coach and sleeping car service between Detroit, Birmingham, and Chicago is growing as a public hearing date nears, according to a survey by the Michigan Railroad Club. The railroad group, promoters of many popular rail excursions in the Detroit-Windsor area, urges users of the rail service to protest the cutback.

After being turned down by the Michigan Public Service Commission in an earlier bid to discontinue the service, G.T.W. appealed to the Interstate Commerce Commission for a favorable ruling. The I.C.C. has set a public hearing for today at 9:30 a.m. in the Federal Building at Detroit.
