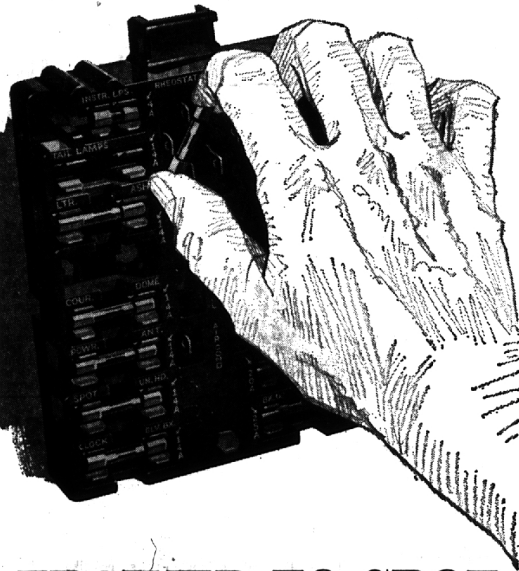
HOWEVER, rather than watch the show, they actually participated in it as supernumeraries or extras.
