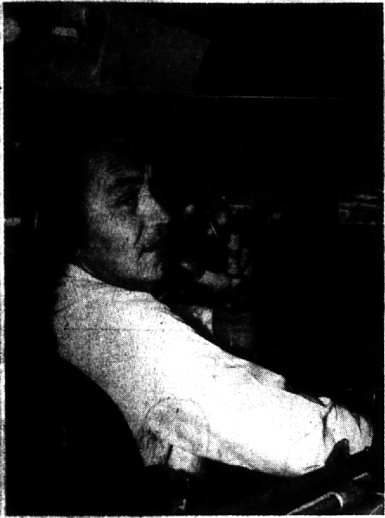

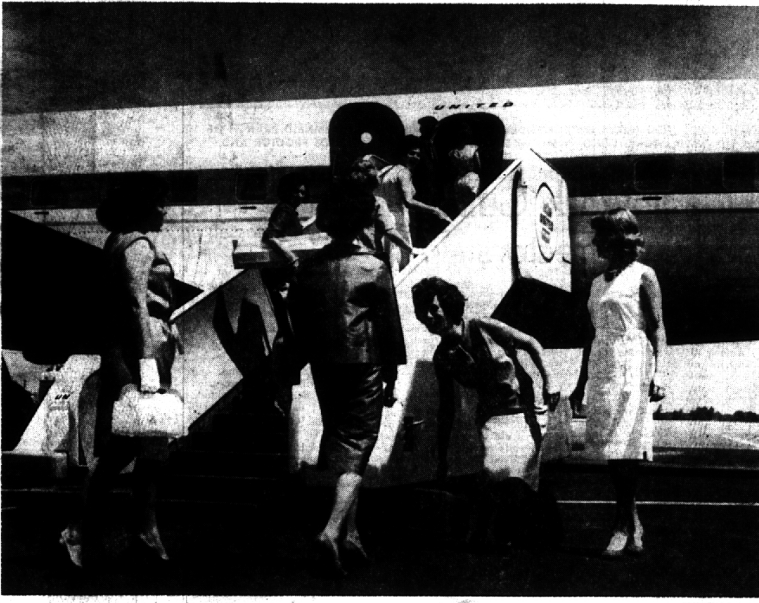

In conclusion Mrs. Lewis said, "Perhaps the most important gift we offer as a club is that of ourselves as direct-service volunteers. As you look over the list of contributions, you will be hard put to select one of the recipients wherein our membership does not play a constructive volunteer role. Since such community effort is the club's raison-d'être, none of us is surprised. Rather, let us increase our efforts to make our club an even more effective force in our community."
