## BRIDGE in BIRMINGHAM

The hand for today was played recently at the Birmingham YMCA, and you may remember it. There were 12 tables that played this hand and not more than two tables had the same results.

When Tom Hill and Fred Cassidy played this hand they arrived at the best contract and played it properly and made an almost top board.

One pair playing this hand did do better than Tom and Fred, but they had quite an assist by their opponents. They played the board at six no trumps and were able to bring in the contract.

The bidding:  
South West North East

Opening lead: J ♣

Tom won the opening lead of the jack of clubs in the dummy, and on the next play led a low heart toward the closed hand. East made his best play by jumping in with the king of hearts and returned a spade. Tom played the ace and drew two more rounds of clubs, discarding dummy's other spade.

At this juncture, the declarer found it easy to ruff a second heart in the closed hand and dummy was solid for the balance of the tricks. The same results could have been achieved even with a spade lead.

It is true that another pair did bid and make six no trumps, but I do not consider this a proper contract. East can always beat the contract with a logical handling of the heart suit and had there been a spade opening, the contract would have been doomed from the start.
