The said bonds will be dated July 1, 1964, and will be coupon bonds in the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, will be numbered consecutively by the direct order of their maturities from 1 to 239, both inclusive, at a rate or rates not exceeding 4% per annum, compounded semi-annually on September 1st and 1st day of September in each year as follows:

The interest rate for each coupon interest bond shall be paid by the purchaser of such bonds. All bids must be accompanied by a check for the purchase price of the bonds, payable to the order of the Treasurer of the Village of Franklin, Michigan, and the interest thereon, without limitation as to rate or amount.  
None of said bonds are subject to redemption prior to maturity.  
The issuer of said bonds was approved by the election of the voters of the Village of Franklin, Michigan, on March 9, 1964, for the purpose of defraying a part of the cost of the acquisition, construction, improvement in the Village of Franklin, Michigan, of the general obligations of the Village which is authorized and required by law to levy upon all taxable property therein such ad valorem taxes as may be necessary to pay said bonds and the interest thereon, without limitation as to rate or amount.

For the purpose of awarding the bonds, the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from July 1, 1964 to their respective maturities and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest interest cost to the Village. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds or at a price less than par value will be considered.  
A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$4,000.00 drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the Village must accompany each bid as a guarantee of good faith. The part of the bidder, to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid be accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. **YOUR GARDEN CLINIC**  
**CHORES & PLEASURES**  
Too bad these things get mixed up with one another but such is the nature of things.  
CONSIDER: School is out, June Beetles are in, vacations start and so do Rose Chafers, patios and terraces need fixing up, vegetables to be planted, Father's Day is the 21st and the Barbecue Grill is shot, etc. Well, let's get on with it.

- HOLLYHOCKS and DELPHINIUMS should be frequently dusted with SULPHUR or sprayed with BORDEXAUX.
- Small patio TABLES with glass tops and tile tops are immediately available—to set things on, you know (F.D.)
- The last feeding of deciduous and needle trees should be done this month. The best way is with a ROSS ROOT FEEDER. (F.D.)
- SCOPE is the interesting new systemic INSECTICIDE. Simply sprinkle the granules around the plant, rake in lightly and let rain or sprinkling do the mixing. Effective for about 6 weeks in controlling sucking insects such as aphids, mites, thrips, white flies & leaf hoppers.
- A light red 4-legged stool is a joy as an extra seat when extra friends pop in unexpectedly. Strong, good looking, light. \$4.95 (F.D.)
- "F.D." means GOOD FATHER'S DAY IDEA.
- Don't forget SUNDAY, JUNE 21st!!  
FATHER'S DAY
- Most lawns will need a second feeding this month—early. To help all summer we suggest a slow-release or organic type material. The proper amount for most mixed lawns will apply 2 1/2 lbs of NITROGEN to each 1000 sq. ft.—as 2 - 3 1/2 lb. bags AGRICO 16-9-3 to 6000 sq. ft. 2 - 22 lb. bags GREENFIELD 20-10-5 to 6000 sq. ft. A well fertilized lawn requires LESS water to keep it green. REMEMBER THIS—Frequent shallow waterings promote the shallow-rooted evils such as quack grass, chickweed, bent grass, etc.
- In a lighter vein we suggest that the soft glow of candles will provide an entrancing amount of light for your patio or terrace—or, in fact, any place in the yard you wish to put them (even on the croquet court or horseshoe pits for late players). Wrought iron with old fashioned chimneys and new fancied candles. (F.D.)
- WILKINSON SWORD CO. cutting tools (in addition to the famous RAZOR BLADES. (F.D.)

- Ideal time to plant the vegetable garden is NOW. Onions, beets, endive, cabbage, snap beans, cucumbers, summer squash, corn, lima beans, etc.
- You wash your knife and fork after eating—why not treat your lawn mower as well? It will last longer and stay in better condition.
- Can't help getting back to FOUNTAINS and BIRD BATHS & GARDEN FIGURES. The cast stone type are not too expensive and there are hundreds of combinations. They really become a most enjoyable feature of a yard or terrace—especially with a recirculating pump. (F.D.)
- Keep your sprayer and duster going like mad this month—most plants and ornamentals need this help. DDT is fine but has a long residual effect. MALATHION is fine but has a 5 day effect. A combination of these two is excellent and is represented by ISOTOX or Mc-B GARDEN SPRAY. SEVIN also is very good for many things and less toxic than DDT.
- LAWNS are exhibiting changes in color, browning out. BRING a six inch square section to us. It should include part of the discolored section and the adjacent green part.
- Plant leaf and flower problems can best be diagnosed if you bring in adequate samples. Don't be chincy like the person who brought in the upper half of one blade of grass — Be Generous.
