ator runner-up. The following week, after an engine tune-up by Branster, they came out on top.

The team's best time was 11.99 seconds with a top-end speed of 124.5 miles per hour.

BRANSTER became interested in the drag when he attended the 1962 NHRA Nationals as a spectator. He became so interested talking with the drivers and pit crews, that he decided to enter the competition.

Several months later, Branster bought a car and looked up Lindamood. "Color Me Gone" survived a dozen elimination rounds, finishing in second place in their opening session.

The next week, the pair drove off with top honors at Detroit Dragway and made it their habit. They came close to beating the strip record in 1963 with a best-time of 11.98 seconds and a 122 mph top-end speed.

At last season's Summer Nationals in Indianapolis,

Lindamood turned in the fastest opening day time and made it to the semi-finals.

prospects appear bright for the combination. Branster would like to see his Dodge Ramcharger strip in for a strip with the "Color Me Gone."
