



Harry Brooks Post-Treasured By Resident

An envelope postmarked Feb. 25, 1930 to "Master Richard Wilson" is a prized possession today of Wilson Drug Company President, Dick Wilson, 101 N. Woodward, Birmingham.

Further marking its value is the large blue special post of an airplane, encircled by the motto: "In memory of one who served and sacrificed his life to promote aviation."

THAT "ONE" so honorably mentioned was Harry Brooks, famous in his day in Birmingham as a chief test pilot for Henry Ford.

The inside letter from Wilson's father reads:

"Save this envelope as memory of Harry Brooks, whose family and himself were friends of your mother and daddy."

"Harry lost his life in the ocean near Miami, Florida, in a flight with a Ford Fliver airplane. He was headed to be one of the country's great fliers had he lived."

Just before this happened on Christmas he piloted Mrs. Lindbergh to Mexico City."

GOP Picks Directors For New Districts

With the acceptance by the Michigan Supreme Court of the Republican-sponsored plan for the reapportionment of Representative and Senatorial seats in the State Legislature, Oakland County now has 10 legislative districts instead of the former six. As part of a program of improving the Republican Party county organization and increasing its citizen participation, Charles L. Lyle, GOP county chairman, has appointed directors for each one of the ten new districts.

The County organization had been expanded in recent weeks from six district directors to eight, but uncertainty as to the exact location of the legislative districts held back further enlargement. The recent Supreme Court decision gave the go-ahead to final improvements.

Appointments of the new legislative District Directors were announced by Dale Feet, Republican campaign director, as follows:

WILLIAM Fleming, former director of the eastern half of the first district will become director for the entire new first district composed of the townships of Addison, Oakland, Oxford, Orion, Brandon, Independence, Groveland, Springfield, White Lake, Holly, Rose, and Highland.

John Colson, former director of the western half of the third district and temporary chairman of the now superseded 19th Congressional District, will become director of the new Third District, which includes Waterford and West

Overseas Posts Open for Teachers

The Overseas Placement Officer at Selfridge Air Force Base, has announced that 200 qualified teachers are still needed for the 1964-65 year in the Department of Defense Overseas Dependents Schools. Single applicants are particularly needed.

Approximately 100 primary teachers are needed for most areas. There is also a shortage for science and math, elementary remedial reading and mentally retarded in most areas. Other vacancies include: Librarian (Labrador, Azores, Newfoundland), high school counselor (Labrador, Philippines), industrial arts (Libya, Turkey), social studies and physical education (England), social studies and latin (Europe), art and English (Labrador), and Latin and English (Labrador).

Birmingham applicants must be at least 21 years of age, a U. S. citizen, have a bachelor's degree, and two years teaching experience.

Birmingham applicants must be to serve in such demanding positions.

"We consist of about 6,000 volunteers who give varying amounts of time to the Party effort. City Schools Get Clothing Drive Award

For its participation in the 22nd annual Bundle Days drive of Save the Children Federation, the Birmingham Public Schools received a special award from the Federation.

The presentation was made by SCF National Director Vern H. Penning and was received on behalf of the Birmingham school system by Dr. John B. Smith, superintendent.

Penning disclosed that the Birmingham Schools have participated in the drive for ten consecutive years and during that time have collected more than 40,000 pounds of clothing. More than 6,000,000 school children throughout the country take part in the Federation's clothing program each year

and contribute about 2,000,000 pounds of clothing.

ESTABLISHED 32 years ago, the Federation maintains more than 100 clothing centers in the Southern Appalachian mountain regions where used clothing is distributed to the mountain people of Kentucky, Tennessee and Virginia.

Founded in 1932, Save the Children Federation is an international nonsectarian welfare organization and is registered with the U.S. State Department Advisory Committee on Voluntary Foreign Aid. Children are aided by the Federation through sponsorships, family, school and community self-help projects, a self-help scholarship fund, and an annual collection of used clothing. The Federation helps American Indian children, in the Southern Appalachian Mountains and in 17 countries overseas.
