Stanley Brown Seeks Republican Nomination

Stanley M. Brown, 44, of 632 Ardmore, Bloomfield Township, today announced his candidacy for nomination for state representative in the Republican primary.

He seeks nomination to the 47th Legislative District seat now held by Henry M. Hogan, Jr.

Brown is owner of the Brown Industrial Sales Co., 1834 S. Woodward, Birmingham.

He was a candidate for representative to Congress from Oakland County in 1952, was elected judge in Southfield Township in 1953, sought to become the county's senator in Lansing in 1956

and was a candidate for nomination for the third district legislative post in the 1960 primary.

He has served as precinct delegate for several years and has been an active party worker and money-raiser.

BROWN SAID he believes "the Republican Party should welcome citizens of all beliefs to its fold and promote party harmony and effectiveness by using all of their talents."

Brown said that "with a life-long interest in politics and government, I believe I am qualified to be an effective voice of this community in the state legislature."

Stating that he has had "a life-long ambition to be an effective public influence," Brown said his heart is on the side of conservative Republicanism.

A WORLD War II veteran, he served as an Air Force pilot and squadron commander. He holds a multiengine commercial pilot's rating and recently was recommended by Cong. William S. Broomfield (R., Royal Oak) and State Rep. Farrell E. Roberts (R., Pontiac) for appointment to the Metropolitan Aviation Authority.

Brown is a member of the Pontiac Elks Lodge 810, Annets, Air Force Association, Quiet Birdmen, Elks Club, Hillside Country Club, Birmingham Republican Club and Kirk in the Hills.

He and his wife Dorothy have four children: Mrs. Larry L. Haid, a student at Hillsdale College; Glen, in the Marines; Marsha, at Derby Junior High; and Deborah, at Berkshire Junior High.

Club Planning Campaign for Building Fund

Representative Post Eyed by S'field Man

C. Hugh Dohany, long-time Southfield and Oakland County legislator, announced his candidacy for the office of state representative from the new 48th Legislative district, House district 6.

The new district encompasses the cities of Lathrup Village, Southfield, Berkley and Huntington Woods. Dohany will file as a Republican.

The second lawmaker presently serves on the Southfield City Council and the Oakland County Board of Supervisors, having held both posts since 1958. He has been Southfield's Council President during four of those years.

On the board of supervisors, Dohany currently holds membership on the ways and means committee, and has served on the buildings and grounds, inter-county governmental study, veterans' affairs and local tax committees.

For three years he has been a member of the legislative committee of the Michigan Municipal League.

Dohany, 44, his wife and three children live in Southfield, where he is a lifelong resident. He holds a supervisory position with the Detroit Edison company, where he has been employed for 23 years.
