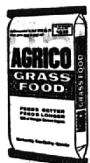

### Ex-Commissioner Vying for 10th District Seat

Former Troy City Commissioner James F. Carey announced today his candidacy for state representative in the 10th Legislative District of Oakland County, which includes Troy, Clawson, Rochester, Avon and Pontiac townships and Lake Orion.

Carey, 43, will campaign on the Republican platform. Employed by Detroit Edison as an equipment purchaser, he lives at 2891 Brookside, Troy. He has been a Troy resident for the last eight years, and a resident of Oakland County for the last twelve years.

Active in civic affairs and in city, county and state politics, Carey served as a commissioner in the City of Troy until April of this year. Also, he was a member of Troy's Planning Commission from 1956 to 1958, and as that body's chairman from 1958 to 1961, when he resigned to become a successful candidate for the Troy City Commission.

ON The county level, Carey is now serving in his third year, as Troy City Commissioner appointed to the Oakland County Board of Supervisors. In this capacity, he is chairman of the Cooperative Extension Committee.

An active member of the Troy Republican Party, Carey has participated in state-wide party activities for the past several years. He is a lieutenant in his precinct, and has attended Republican county and state conventions as both a delegate and alternate delegate.

that place. Do you suppose that a court case, feeling that nobody can beat President Johnson may be responsible, in large part, for an apparent lack of strong, active interest in this year's election?

President Johnson often emphatically declares that the pending civil rights legislation "will be enacted into law because justice and morality demand its passage." Proceeding on the same theory, Mister President, does not the Bobby Baker case require full and complete exposure, "in the name and cause of justice and morality"?

In very generation, men will risk their lives to get money—whether it be by hard work in remote places, or in some form of so-called sport. An example is that 500 annual auto race at Indianapolis. Over the last Memorial Day two racers were killed and five badly injured and burned. In some previous years similar fatalities have occurred, too. But, in spite of the risk, similar races will be held again and again. Man is, after all, an adventurous being.

Do you know that the state of Pennsylvania elected a Philadelphian millionaire socialist to Congress, whose name is Joseph Clark? This chap wants the Executive Dept. of the federal government to acquire greater power with the legislative boys and girls to lose most of their power. The senator believes that Russia does well with her system and that the U.S.A. would show unlimited progress if it were to do away with the present slow and cumbersome processes of democracy. Maybe Sen. Joseph Clark ought to prove his convictions by giving his fortune to some of the poor people in his state, thus simplifying the Marxist doctrine of "from each according to his ability, to each according to his need."

**Ambulance Service Contract Renewed**  
City commissioners Monday night authorized the administration to enter into a contract with the Birmingham Ambulance Service for another year.

The firm will provide emergency service to the city at a cost of \$500 per month. This is a \$50-a-month increase over 1963.  
City Manager L. R. Gare said the higher rate had been set because of an increase in maintenance and personnel costs. The firm has served the city for four years.  
As in 1962 and 1963, Birmingham Ambulance was the only firm to submit bids, Gare said.
