

### Oakland Democrats Name 14 to Attend National Convention

Fourteen Oakland County residents were elected as delegates and alternates to the National Democratic Convention in August at the State Convention in Lansing on June 13.

Elected as delegates-at-large were Stuart Hertzberg of Oak Park and August Scholle of Royal Oak; alternates-at-large, Gene Kubby of Royal Oak, Mrs. Hank Eldridge of Ferndale, Avera Cohn

of Royal Oak and Leon Hill of Huntington Woods.

Elected to represent the old 14th Congressional District as delegates were Sander Levin of Berkley, Mrs. William Clark of Bloomfield Township, Kenneth Morris of Troy, Mrs. Luther Olson of Drayton Plains. Alternates are Old Lawrence of Pontiac, Mrs. Donald Beck of Farmington Township, John Coleman of Waterford and William O'Brien of Clawson.

The entire state delegation to the national convention in Atlantic City Aug. 24 to 27 numbers 102 delegates and 50 alternates.

### Magee Quits Beverly Post; 2 Seats Open

BEVERLY HILLS—John Magee Monday night became the second congressman to resign from an eleven-month legislative body within the last two months.

Magee, elected in March, 1963, quit his post in order to accept a new job in Chicago.

Clive, president of the council for seven years, resigned in April because of a job transfer to New Jersey.

In his first try for public office, Magee won a two-year term by placing second in a field of seven candidates in the March, 1963, election.

MAGEE, 44, has accepted a sales management position with Desoto Chemical Co. He has been in technical sales with Jones-Dabney, auto finish manufacturers in Hamtramck.

He, his wife and three children, live at 17181 Beechwood.

Potential candidates to fill the two vacancies will be interviewed by the village council tonight.

### Hearing Called For Sidewalk Repair Program

A hearing of necessity will be held on July 6 for Birmingham's 1964 sidewalk replacement program.

City Engineer William T. Killeen said the cost of the project would be about \$40,000. The City's share will be about \$14,000 and the property owners' about \$26,000.

Seven general areas of the city are included in the 1964 program, Killeen said. This year's project includes all of the city that has not been covered since the program began in 1961.

Eight other sections of the city have minor programs, Killeen said.

Property owners have been notified if they are affected by the project.

### School Board Seeks State OK for Bonds

The Birmingham Board of Education has applied to the state superintendent of public instruction for qualification of the \$5,380,000 in bonds approved by the voters June 8.

The application to the state is a formal step that must be taken before the proposal can be brought before the Municipal Bonding Authority.

At a special meeting Tuesday night, the board authorized the school administration to borrow \$200,000 in anticipation of the collection of operating taxes due Dec. 1.

In other action the board decided to make application for National Defense Education Act funds toward the purchase of data processing equipment for use in the school business office and in a mathematics course.

DIRECTOR of Finance Lloyd Van Buskirk, Jr., estimated that the schools would be able to save up to \$100,000 if they qualify for federal funds and are able to take advantage of manufacturers discounts.

He said Birmingham's share of the cost of the equipment would be between \$50,000 and \$55,000.

### Ask Dissolution Of Mulholland's

One of Birmingham's oldest businesses, the F. J. Mulholland Co., 233 N. Woodward, has filed a petition in Oakland County Circuit Court for dissolution of the corporation.

Pontiac attorney Robert Hodge, who has been appointed temporary receiver of the firm, said a hearing would be held on July 2 to determine if the corporation should be dissolved and a permanent receiver named.

The petitioners for the company were Charles W. Frank W. and Mary N. Mulholland and Mary Lou Kidd, all directors of the firm.

Mulholland's has been in business in Birmingham for 42 years. The store, originally located at 109 N. Woodward, was founded on June 29, 1922, by Frank J. Mulholland.

Later the store was moved to one of the buildings occupied by the Kregge Co. It moved to its present location in 1928. The store underwent a face-lifting in 1949.

### State Senator Seeks Appeals Court Post

Farrell E. Roberts, Oakland County State Senator and chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, announced that he is a candidate for the new State Court of Appeals.

Roberts declared for the non-partisan nomination from the Second District. The district consists of 16 counties and includes the entire southeastern part of the state except Wayne County.

The 42-year-old attorney is currently serving his second term in the Senate after two terms as a State Representative. He is a partner in the Pontiac law firm of Dietler and Roberts, Pontiac.

Roberts, 2485 LaFay, West Bloomfield Township is a member of the Oakland County, Michigan, and American Bar Associations. He is also a member of the Delta Theta Phi Law Fraternity.

THE COURT of Appeals was provided for by the new State Constitution to allow easier appeals for litigants and to relieve the backlog of cases appealed to the State Supreme Court.

A strong believer in the necessity for such a court, Roberts was sponsor of the bill setting up the court. He successfully fought for its passage after a similar bill failed to pass the 1963 extra session.

As enacted, the bill follows the constitutional provision for nine judges. Three judges will be elected from each of three election districts at the general election Nov. 3.

Pam Guest, a petite blue-eyed blonde from Birmingham, has been chosen Channel 7's Sunny Seven for the month of June by five local public service agencies.

Mrs. Guest, mother of two little boys, is a photographic model. During the month of June she will deliver public service messages on WXYZ-TV for the United States Air Force, Small Business Administration, Children's Hospital Poison Control Center, Traffic Safety Association and the Huron Clinton Metropolitan Authority.

The Sunny Seven competition is open to all girls between the ages of 18 and 35.

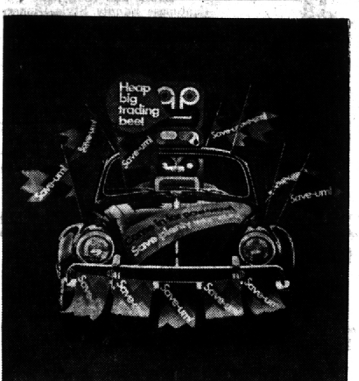
