

O-U Named Scholarship Test Center

High school graduates and college undergraduates who wish to apply for a Michigan scholarship award should pick up applications right away at Oakland University's admissions office, according to Herbert N. Stoughton, director of admissions.

He reports that Oakland is one of 36 Michigan schools approved as a test center for the Scholastic Aptitude Test which will be given June 24.

UNDER THE provisions of a bill signed into law on May 22 establishing a State Competitive Scholarship Program, the Michigan Higher Education Assistance Authority shall award not less than three first-year scholarships to residents of each legislative district in Michigan, and the balance of scholarships shall be awarded to residents at large.

The State Legislature appropriated \$500,000 to be distributed for this college year, 1964-65.
