Inch Worms Winning Battle In Spray Vs. Don't Spray

After seeing a tree completely defoliated it is easy to hop on the fence and say, "Where do I stand on spraying?" On the farm with thousands of trees you are not aware of the onslaught on trees by inch worms.

tion due to being packaged in a ball. Silt the packing but do not remove it. Make a large hole for the placing of the evergreen, fill the hole around the placed evergreen half full with peat moss. Then water generously and fill with good soil.

As far as perennials and annuals are concerned you can transplant them right through the season if you work quickly to avoid air exposure to the roots. You

must cover them after planting from this date forward.

You can use berry boxes of wood for the annuals and packing boxes for the perennials. I have often used shirt cardboard folders for the annuals. This covering should be kept in place at least three days after planting with a constant awareness of the need of moisture.

IF YOU have a slope which has to be controlled for erosion in a sunny location consider the handsome very low growing juniper horizontalis Douglasii. It will provide a beautiful evergreen cover for important locations. After you place the young plants, you might like to employ medium size boulders between the plantings to control immediate erosion.

Keep Chemicals For Pool Away From Children

They won't fade or rub off. In addition to these directions, manufacturers publish literature which also gives directions on how and how much to use.

If you can get a group of teenagers together, and possibly a few adults, you can arrange for a series of life-saving and water safety lessons in your own pool. If this isn't possible, having members of your family enroll in such classes elsewhere is excellent water safety insurance.

"The Leadership Challenge" is the theme chosen for the 56th annual meeting expected to attract more than 5,000 home economists from all parts of the country.

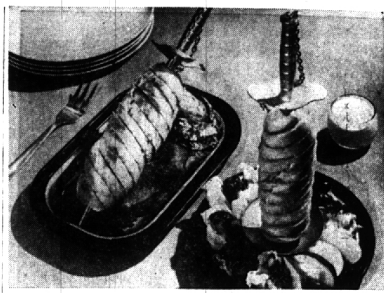

Pool Games Add Splash of Fun

"Just swimming" is fun, but variety gives the real spice to life in and around the pool.

A supply of pool games will be of particular delight to the younger set, to say nothing of easing mother's chaperoning duties. Adults, too, will get more enjoyment out of the pool by playing any number of water games.

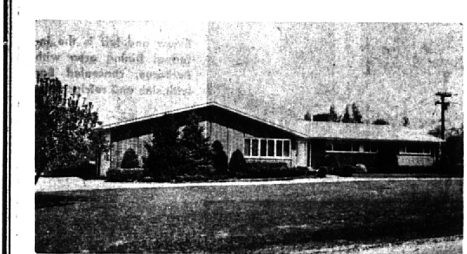
For the nimrods who want to keep in practice, there's a natural in a plug casting contest. Simply put an inflated bicycle tube, tire tube, or life tube in the center of the pool. Using a wooden block the size of a plug or a plug with hooks removed, cast at the target. A piece of a broom handle in a casting rod, or your own special pole and string will do for casting contests in any size pool.

A BOWL or pan race is a riot of fun for swimmers of all ages. The object of the game is to push a plastic or light metal pan or pie pan across the pool with chin or nose without shipping water or upsetting it. Any number can play.

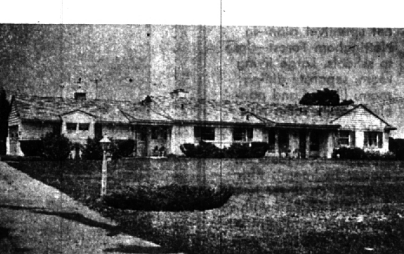
A variation of this game for wetsuits and their wading pools is the balloon blowing game. In this contest, a balloon is placed in the center of the pool. The object is to blow it to the other side of the pool.

Children should be spaced evenly on opposite sides at the start of the contest. Lacking a balloon, a rubber ball or cork will do. Of course, the shallow pan contest can also be used in the wading pool. Rules can vary depending on number of players and pool size.

ANOTHER SKILL game is water quoits. A target made from a piece of a broom handle in a casting rod, or your own special pole and string will do for casting contests in any size pool.



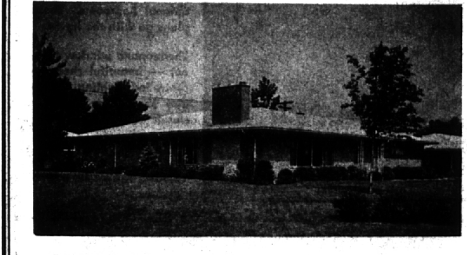

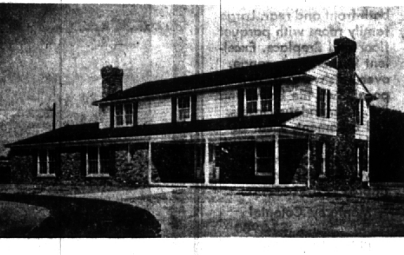
