## BOH Prepares For Annual Detroit Horse Show

### Red Run CC Slates 27th Invitational

Red Run Country Club, celebrating its 50th anniversary, will play host to the 27th annual Club Invitational, the first of its kind in the district.

The four-day affair kicks off today with qualifying rounds to decide medalist honors among the 112 teams scheduled to participate in the event.

GOLFERS WILL battle on a match play, best ball basis with winners to be determined Sunday afternoon. A stag night, with dinner, cocktails and entertainment, will be held following the qualifying today.

Golfers will tee off in seven flights, one less than last year's total as club officials have reduced the number to enable competitors to produce better golf.

Chairman for the event is George Wilson, who will be aided by Watson Brown and Lee Von Ebenstein. Wives of the players will act as hostesses.

HEADING THE field of entries will be defending champions Chuck Burn of Red Run and Joe Brissom. A number of low handicap amateurs are expected to be among the participants.

## A 'Bachelorette' Is Always Running

Ask a woman how a bachelorette manages to stay single and a logical answer might be that he is always on the run.

In Jack Bachelorette's case, the answer would be absolutely correct. This "bachelorette" is continuously running.

A cross country and track performer, Bachelorette, 20, has been engaged in the sport for three years, beginning in his senior year in high school when he wore the maroon and white colors of his school.

SINCE THAT time, Jack has done a lot of running and, though most of it has been in circles, he seems to be blazing a straight path toward cinder stardom and, maybe, a future Olympics.

Bachelorette is presently competing for Miami of Ohio as a sophomore and in two short years has reeled off a number of accomplishments.

He placed 17th in the NCAA cross country meet at Michigan State University last season, flashed to second in the all-Ohio excursion and helped his school place eighth in the country, undefeated in all dual meets.

In his track endeavors this spring, he anchored Miami's winning distance medley relay quartet at Ohio State by legging a 4:12 mile and then returned 90 minutes later to win the 8,000 meter steeplechase, no run around the block, in 9:17.3, a clocking that puts him fifth among the nation's collegiate runners.

## Ft. Riley Jump To Make Debut

Horses will be the center of attraction this next week as Bloomfield Open Hunt opens its facilities to the Detroit Horse Show, largest outdoor horse show of its kind in the nation.

The show, an annual event at the BOH, will for the first time run for a solid week, from June 22-28, with some of the finest hunters and jumpers in the country competing.

The extravaganza will celebrate almost 50 years of growth this season with the inauguration of the new Fort Riley Classic jumping event, and the presentation of a new trophy, the Francis Hopkins Duffy Memorial Trophy.

ENTRIES FROM more than 25 states, including California and Washington, have been received. Exhibitors are also expected from four Canadian provinces.

A total of approximately \$18,000 in show premiums will include more than \$15,000 in cash prizes, trophies and show ribbons. This is a new high in show premiums among the nation's shows rated in the honor category.

The Detroit Horse Show is rated an Honor Show by the American Horse Shows Association, one of the highest honors designated by the ruling group. It is the largest in the country for hunters and jumpers.

A main event in the seven-day show will be the Fort Riley Classic, a new jumping event that will take place Saturday night, June 27. The course is based on prom-

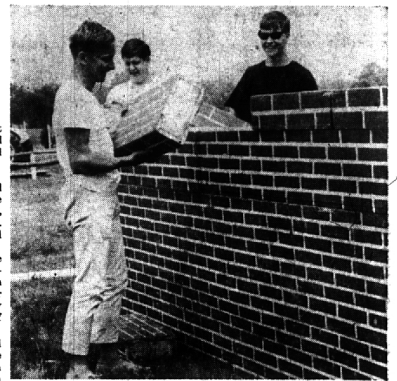
inent physical features of Fort Riley in Kansas and was designed by Col. Charles H. Anderson, noted horse judge.

THE SPECIALLY designed and constructed jumps will carry the emblems of cavalry regiments, along with their motto, The U.S. Army Band has recorded special music for the event.

Winner of the event will receive the Francis Hopkins Duffy Trophy, which was hand-crafted in England about 1850. A check for \$1,000 will also be presented by Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Moses of Bloomfield Hills.

The popular jumping events will be staged the final two days of the show, Saturday and Sunday, with the Fort Riley Classic for open jumpers starting at 9 p.m. in the Main Show Ring.

Also featured in this year's show is the Colonel I. L. Kitts Memorial Trophy Class, a special dressage class scheduled for Monday. (See JUMP, 5-E)

## Birmingham Youths to Enter Fitness Meet at Port Huron

Birmingham will be one of 55 cities participating in the seventh annual Detroit-Metropolitan Cities Youth Fitness Program July 30 in Port Huron's Memorial Stadium.

The event, derived from the general pattern of the World Olympics Meet, scheduled to be held at Pierce Field on Thursday, July 23, at 6:30 p.m.

Last year's Youth Fitness Day attracted 2,000 finalists between 10 and 15 years of age, representing upwards of a quarter of a million youths from 45 Metropolitan Detroit recreation districts.

This year's Youth Fitness Day will be dedicated in memory of

BIRMINGHAM and the other member cities will each conduct a Youth Fitness Day to determine the winners in each competitive activity.

Birmingham's winners will be selected at the Junior Olympics Meet, scheduled to be held at the Detroit-Ford Field on Thursday, July 23, at 6:30 p.m.

The program follows the basic concepts of President Eisenhower's original Committee of Youth Fitness and stresses the vigorous physical activity advocated by the late President Kennedy's Council.

President Kennedy. Terry McDermott, 1964 Winter Olympic Gold Medal winner, has been invited to attend the program.

ALSO EXPECTED to attend the event are 45 mayors, village presidents and township supervisors, along with state and federal officials and a member of the President's Council on Youth Fitness.

The program will start with a torch bearing ceremony and colorful mass calisthenics before the boys and girls begin competition in the various field and running events. (See FITNESS, 2-E)

In the Colt League, the Tigers swept to their 9th straight win, a 3-1 victory over the Orioles, to

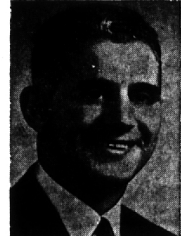
avenge their only defeat of the year. Jim Eichner fanned 12, allowed just three hits and drove in all of his team's runs.

The meet, held at Hazel Park June 2, was won by Mt. Clemens, Seaholm, winners for the past nine years, placed second.



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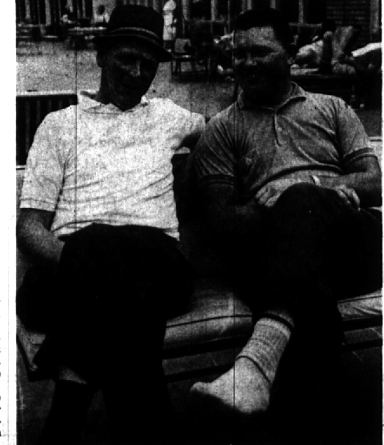
