"We got to break this log-jam," he said. Attorney Harry Wise, representing many of the property owners in the area, said his people were not interested in turning the streets into expressways. Wise said he would also like to see the City adopt an overall policy on paving and not "segregate" one area.

MRS. EDITH HAWKINS, 347 Catalpa, said she agreed with Ingraham's idea so it would not make it "too hard on anyone at one time." Commissioner David F. Breck said he had first thought the paving of the streets would improve

the area but had since changed his mind. "We must be controlled by what the people want," Breck said. Both Ingraham and Mayor Charles W. Renfrew expressed concern over paying too much attention to the number of people opposing the project in attendance at the meeting.

RENFEW SAID the commission would be "derelict in its duty" to leave decisions up to a vote of the people in the commission room.

Ingraham questioned the value placed on the percentage of people for or against an improvement. "The city commission is elected to make decisions and not to count noses on proposals," Ingraham said. Breck argued that the commission couldn't make decisions without concern for the people. "We must hear them and then decide," he said.

Ingraham called for a discussion soon on just what the policy of the commission was to be on the improvements of streets. Mayor Renfrew added that he believed as a matter of policy improvements should be put in when they are for the good of the city but when an issue has "local character" he felt compelled to listen to the feeling of the people.
