At the annual Cranbrook Awards Night, held June 12, the major awards for student activities this year and the leaders for next year were announced.

John Kopchick, of Muir, Mich., head prefect of Cranbrook's student body, was awarded the highest honor Cranbrook can give—the Citizenship Award. This award goes to the boy who has made the greatest total contribution to the school. John, who attended Cranbrook for three years, participated in almost all areas of school life.

Hills Science Student to Attend Forum

Edward Kusy, 4540 Lakeview Court, Bloomfield Hills high school student, is among the 62 participants in the National Science Foundation Institute being conducted June 15 to July 17 at St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn.

More than 200 applied for the five-week summer program from among top high school students across the nation. Selection was made on a basis of scholarship, interest and faculty recommendation.

The institute offers special work in either biology, chemistry, mathematics or physics on a scholarship basis to a selected group of pre-college students who have completed the 11th grade.

THE PROGRAM has as its objective the identification and encouragement of outstanding science and mathematics students at a critical period of their education.

All instructional costs and fees are paid by the National Science Foundation and in special cases subsistence support is provided. Director of the program is Dr. Wesley A. Pearson of the St. Olaf chemistry dept.
