own representatives, city, county and state officials for a model state. The girls were assigned to cities, petition for offices, form party platform and caucused their way into a whirlwind ten days of self-government.

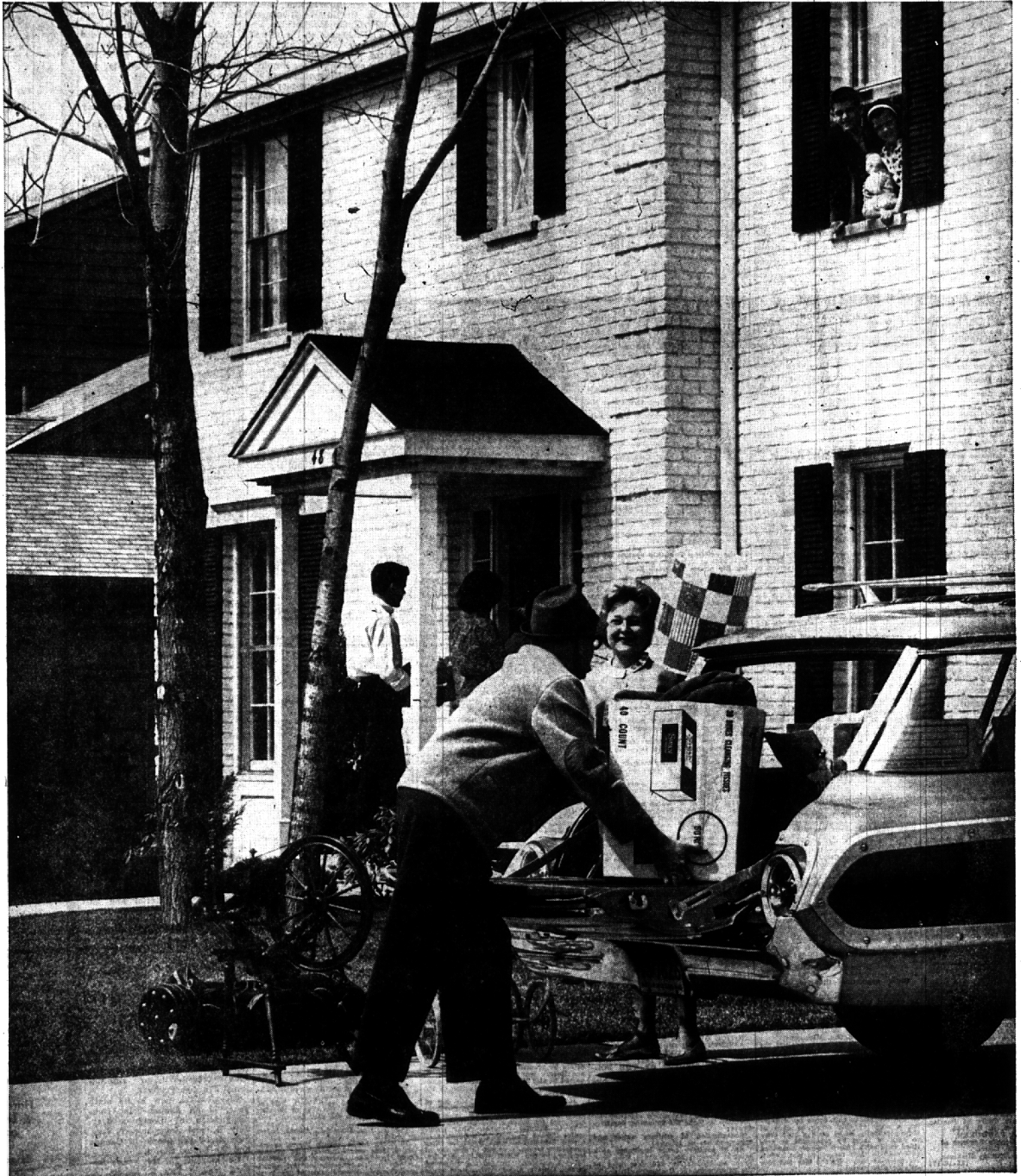
