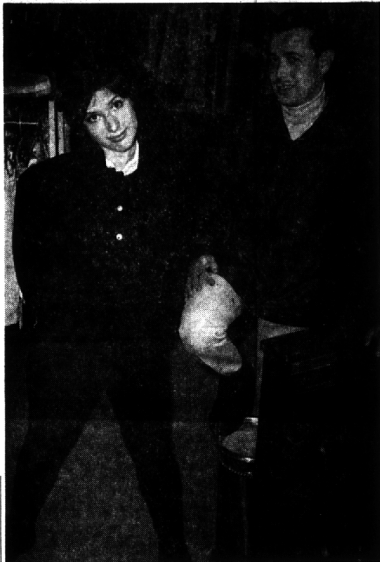
New members to join the group at its next meeting in the fall are Mrs. Jack Lofgren of Royal Oak and Mrs. David H. Roberts of Lathrup.
